COUNTY AGENT'S NOTES.

The county agent will be at Walhalla in the morning and at Scribner's Pharmacy, Seneca, on Saturday, July 15th, from 1 to 5 p. m., for the purpose of holding consultations with farmers of that section of the county. On Saturday, July 29th, it is planned to be in Westminster for the same purpose.

Oconee Club Boys' Encampment. The first encampment of Oconee county club boys will be held this year at Clemson College on Thursday, Friday and Saturday, July 20th, 21st and 22d.

Approximately 200 boys from the farms of Oconee, Anderson and Pickens counties are expected to take a part in this first tri-county encampment, and it is expected to be a great success.

Club Officers, 1922. In the corn, pig and cotton clubs of the county, four community clubs are in operation, with the following named officers: Oak Grove—Clarence Petty, president; Louise Pritchard, vice president; Geor Pritchard, secretary.

Agents' Meeting at Clemson. County agents from over the entire State will be in session at Clemson College from July 11th, 12th and 13th. Foremost in the discussions will be the boll weevil problem, and the manner in which the counties of the lower part of the State have already diversified and are now meeting the situation. There will be a demonstration in the use of various poisoning machines as well as instructions in the field in making the proper infestation counts before attempting to poison. Buster Rouse—Housebreaking and larceny. Pleading guilty. Sentenced to six months at hard labor on county works or State penitentiary. John Lynch—Disposing of property under lien. Pleading guilty. Sentenced to three months at hard labor in penitentiary or on county works, or pay fine of \$150. That on payment of \$150 balance of sentence be suspended.

W. B. Ashmore—Violation of prohibition law. Pleading guilty. Sentenced to six months at hard labor in penitentiary or on county works, or pay fine of \$250. That on payment of \$50 balance of sentence be suspended during good behavior. W. B. Sanford—Disposing of property under lien. Guilty. Sentenced to six months on county works or in penitentiary at hard labor, or pay fine of \$150. On payment of \$50 sentence to be suspended.

Albert Butler—Violation of prohibition law. Pleading guilty. Sentenced to three months on county works or in penitentiary, at hard labor, or pay fine of \$100. On payment of \$50 balance of sentence to be suspended during good behavior. E. C. Cobb—Violation of prohibition law. Pleading guilty. Sentenced to penitentiary or county works, at hard labor, for three months, or pay fine of \$100. On payment of \$75 balance of sentence suspended during good behavior.

Floyd Hughs—Murder. Guilty of manslaughter with recommendation to mercy of court. Sentenced to two years in State Reformatory. John Thomas—Violation of prohibition law. Pleading guilty. Sentenced to three months on county works or in penitentiary, at hard labor, or pay fine of \$100. On payment of \$75 the balance of sentence to be suspended during good behavior.

Edrew Sloan (alias Tobe Sloan)—Housebreaking and larceny. Pleading guilty. Sentenced to six months on county works or in penitentiary, at hard labor. Robert Redmond—Violation of prohibition law. Pleading guilty. Sentenced to three months on county works or in penitentiary, or pay fine of \$100. Sentence suspended until first day of November term upon giving bond in sum of \$300.

William Grant—Disposing of property under mortgage. Not guilty. Kay Smith and Arthur Garner—Housebreaking and larceny. Guilty. Sentenced to one year on county works or in penitentiary. Dan Jamerson—Violation of prohibition law. Pleading guilty. Sentenced to three months in penitentiary or on county works, at hard labor, or pay fine of \$100. Sentence suspended until first day of next term of court, upon defendant entering bond in sum of \$200.

Dover Dodgens and John Cash—Violation of prohibition law. Pleading guilty. Each sentenced to six months or pay fine of \$100. That said sentence run concurrently with the sentence imposed by U. S. Court, and that all further sentence be suspended during good behavior upon payment of the sum of \$50. Dan Jamerson, Bub Tannery, Walter Sheppard and Frank Sheppard—Assault and battery with intent to kill. Guilty of assault and battery of a high and aggravated nature. Each sentenced to six months in penitentiary or on public works of county, at hard labor, or pay fine of \$100. Sentence suspended until first day of next term of court, upon defendants entering bond in sum of \$200 each.

D. B. Moody—Violation of prohibition law. Guilty. Sentenced to pay fine of \$150. Defendant under cash bond of \$150. Ordered that same be estreated, and when same is done it shall be in lieu of sentence imposed. Marshall Blackman—Housebreaking and larceny. Guilty. Sentence: That defendant be committed to care and custody of his parents until such time as it may be convenient for the State Board of Health to make examination and give treatment. (It seems apparent that the defendant is a sufferer from incipient tuberculosis.)

Transferred to Contingent Docket. J. Claude Kernels—Bigamy. Mistrial Ordered. In the case of J. M. Haulbrooks, charged with disposing of property under lien, the case was withdrawn from the jury and a mistrial ordered.

Disposition of Appeal Cases. State vs. Robert Owens. Appeal dismissed. Town of Westminster vs. A. E. Taylor and Kinney Burton. Appeal dismissed. Town of Seneca vs. Columbus Hunt. Appeal dismissed. The State vs. Frank Allen. Appeal dismissed. Town of Seneca vs. Eugene Dooly. Transporting intoxicating liquors. Verdict and judgment appealed from. Both affirmed.

FREE CLINIC AT SENECA ON 14th.

People Urged to Attend and Take Advantage of Opportunity Offered.

Seneca, July 11.—Special: Misses Lela Thompson and Sue Nimmons have returned home from a delightful Western trip. They were members of the Elliott touring party and visited San Francisco, Salt Lake City and Yellowstone Park and other places of national interest.

Dr. Cooper makes a specialty of throat and lung diseases, and his examinations and advice are entirely free.

These clinics have been successfully held in Newberry, Anderson, Greenville and other counties in the State. Dr. Cooper will go from Oconee to Pickens county, where two clinics will be held. A health film will be given at the theatre in Seneca this week, the date for the presentation to be announced later. The pictures will also be shown at Jordania, and on Wednesday night the Walhalla theatre will have these health pictures. In this work Dr. Cooper is ably assisted by Miss Gudger, State welfare nurse. She has been actively engaged in meeting with the people of the various communities, telling them of the wonderful decrease in deaths from tuberculosis since the fight has been made to control the dread disease, and what great things the State is doing to help control it.
