THE CO-OPERATIVE MARKETING Of Cotton in South Carolina Goes on in Increasing Volume.

Columbia, Nov. 21.—The continued sweep of co-operative marketing in the State is indicated, officials of the South Carolina Cotton Growers' Co-operative Association said yesterday, by the large number of new contracts coming in daily. Over one hundred new contracts have been received in the past week, and the number of new members is being swelled every day.

There is no membership campaign on at the present time, and practically all of the contracts that are coming in are voluntary, and officials say that they are the result of the satisfaction felt by the members with the manner in which the association is functioning. Credit is being given the association generally for the strength of the cotton market and the present prices of cotton.

One of the large contracts to come in during the past week was from J. P. Williams, of McConnellsville, in York county. Mr. Williams signed the contract this week and has turned over several hundred bales of cotton. Yesterday a letter was received from him stating that a number of other farmers in his section were ready to sign. Letters from Marion brought the news that quite a number of growers in that county were ready to affix their signatures to the contract.

State Gets Much Revenue.

Columbia, Nov. 17.—South Carolina revenues from the income and gasoline taxes authorized at the last session of the General Assembly have amounted to \$1,500,000, according to figures made public to-day by S. T. Carter, State Treasurer. The report covers receipts through to-day. Income taxes have totaled \$909,669.39 and the gasoline tax paid rounded out a total of \$529,153,305. Addition of the receipts from the old three-mill corporation license tax and the domestic corporation license tax show that these taxes thus far have aggregated \$1,802,063.37, according to the Treasurer's statement.
