FARIES FOUND GUILTY MURDER.

Man Who Slew Taylor Childrea at Clover to Pay Penalty.

York, S. C., Nov. 25.—William C. Faries to-day was found guilty of the murder of Newton Taylor at Clover, this State, and the jury did not give a recommendation to mercy.

This verdict automatically carries with it the death sentence. The verdict was not read until a short while after being rendered, owing to the attorneys in the case not being in the court room at the time.

Faries was charged with the murder of Newton Taylor, 14 years of age, at Clover last September.

There was no demonstration. Attorneys for Faries immediately gave notice of a motion for a new trial.

JEFFORDS IS TO DIE ON DEC. 22.

Slayer of Arnette Resentenced—Harrison's Execution Stayed.

Columbia, Nov. 27.—F. M. Jeffords, convicted of the murder last spring of J. C. Arnette, his partner in a gasoline filling station, to-day was resented in criminal court here to be electrocuted at the State penitentiary on Dec. 22.

Glenn Troce, the third of the alleged slayers of Arnette, is serving a life sentence in the State penitentiary.

Arnette was killed, the prosecution contended, during the trial of the three men, in order that Jeffords might collect insurance on his life, a policy having been taken out in favor of the firm.

TOLBERT AGAIN BEEN NAMED.

Senator Dial is Ready and in Trim for Fight in Opposition.

Washington, Nov. 27.—Joseph W. Tolbert, Republican national committeeman for South Carolina, now United States marshal for the Western District of South Carolina by recent appointment by President Harding after the Senate had failed to act on the nomination, having it under investigation, was again nominated for the position by President Harding this afternoon.

Speaking for himself and Senator Smith, Senator Dial said that the new nomination of Tolbert would be fought as vigorously as was the first nomination; that he and Senator Smith would do all that was possible to prevent the confirmation of Tolbert; that he had heretofore declared Tolbert unfit for the position, and that he maintained the same position now as when he first fought the nomination.

Butler to Succeed Justice Day.

Washington, Nov. 23.—The nomination of Pierce Butler, of Minnesota, to be Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of the United States to succeed William R. Day, of Ohio, resigned, was sent by President Harding to-day to the Senate.

Mr. Butler was admitted to practice before the Supreme Court on the 26th of May, 1894, and since then has frequently appeared before that bench in important cases.

Asheville, N. C., Nov. 24.—Coroner E. R. Morris said to-day that he would await arrival from Saluda, N. C., of relatives of Mrs. Cora West, 23 years of age, who was killed yesterday by the discharge of a shotgun while on a hunting trip before deciding whether to hold an inquest.

The husband, Fred J. West, said they had treed an opossum and that his wife became frightened as he started to climb the tree. He embraced her, and a dog stepped on the trigger of the gun, firing it.
