The negroes scattered in every direction, and the whites held the town. The negro leaders are said to be in Jackson. The Governor called upon General George, Chairman of the Democratic Executive Committee; to assist in restoring order. Quiet has been restored. We deplore these bloody conflicts between the races. but the negro leaders are determined to bring them about, in the vain hope of keeping the Republican fabrie from falling to pieces. Such conflicts can only terminate in one way-the utter defeat of the negroes, and we hope they will learn wisdom before it is too late for them,
