MOUNTAIN OF THE HOLY CROSS Among the many interesting descriptions found in Hayden's "Geol, ogy of Colorado," is one of the Mountain of Holy Cross. The main mass of the Peak is composed of granite gneiss, and the summit is discovered with fragments of banded gneiss. The characteristic feature of the mountain, and that which gives it its name, is the vertical face, nearly three thousand feet on the side, with a cross of snow on the top, which may be seen at a distance of fifty to eighty miles from other mountain peaks. This is formed by a vertical fissure about fifteen hundred feet high, with a sort of horizontal step produced by the breaking 'down of the side of the mountain, on which the snow is lodged, and where it remains almost unimpaired by the heat of summer. A beautiful green lake lies at the base of the peak almost up to timber line, and forms a reservoir for the waters of the high peaks that rise on every side.-Ladies Depotitory.


