AN IMPOSTER.—A friend at Easley Station has enclosed to us, two letters from a Mrs. Elizabeth Smith, dated at Youngsville Postoffice, Talapoosa county, Ala., and directed to the Postmaster at that place, making inquiries about one T. Smith lay around Easley for some time, representing himself as a widower, having recently lost a wife in Alabama, and endeavored to marry again. OBITUARY.

Died, of scarlet fever, August 29, 1875, in Pickens county S. C., Addie Prince, aged 17 years, 3 months and 12 days. The deceased was a consistent and devoted member of the Baptist church, having attached herself to that denomination, at Griffin church, in 1875. Though her sufferings were great, she bore them with patience and christian resignation, and often conversed freely about death, always expressing herself ready and willing to go when it was the Master's pleasure to call her. On Wednesday before her death she said to her mother: "We all have to appear before the judgement bar of God," and when asked if she felt ready, when called, to appear there, answered: "I do! I do!" She requested her relatives and friends not to grieve for her, for, said she "it is only a change with me from death to life," and requested her next eldest sister to take good care of her little sister and brother. She thanked her mother for raising her properly and teaching her to read the scriptures; offered up a fervent and earnest prayer in behalf of sinners and for the prosperity of the churches; she also prayed for her enemies. Being fully resigned to death, she fell asleep sweetly in the arms of Jesus, and her sainted spirit was wafted to the realms of heavenly bliss.
