The South Carolina Presbytery. The Presbytery met at Williamston last Friday at 8 p. m. The opening sermon was preached by the retiring moderator, Rev. J. A. Wilson, of Sececa. The elder from Pickens was elected moderator and Mr. P. Quates, of Abbeville, temporary clerk. All the ministers were present except J. B. Adger, H. C. Fennell, J. S. Cosby, T. C. Lige and G. G. Mays. About 30 churches were represented. Rev. James Woodrow, was present and invited to sit as a corresponding member and in expressing his appreciation of the courtesy presented his credentials from Augusta Presbytery and filed his application for membership in South Carolina Presbytery. On motion of Dr. Lindsay a committee to examine the applicant was at once appointed. The committee was composed of J. O. Lindsay, D. D., D. E. Frierson, D. D., and J. R. Tilly, D. D. Dr. Woodrow at once presented himself before the committee. Among other things Dr. Lindsay asked him if he believed the plenary inspiration of the Holy Scriptures. He answered that he did. "Do you believe in the higher criticism?" A. "I believe in legitimate higher criticism—criticism that does not impeach the inspired original." Q. "Do you believe Moses wrote the Pentateuch?" A. All but the account of his own death, which I think he did not write. Q. Do you believe in the hierarchy of the scriptures? A. Yes. The inspired original is absolutely true. Q. Do you believe in probation after death? A. I believe that as the tree falls, so it lies. Q. Do you believe the scriptures as interpreted by the Presbyterian church? A. I accept and believe as true the confession of Faith and shorter Catechism. The vote on receiving Dr. Woodrow was unanimous. The commission appointed to investigate matters relative to the church, reported that it had been unable to do anything. Whereupon it was discharged and a new commission appointed, consisting of Dr. J. O. Lindsay, D. E. Frierson, D. D., R. C. Ligon and Elders C. T. Martin and O. A. Brown. Calls from Home Path and Greenville churches were placed in the hands of Rev. J. T. McBryde, D. D., which he asked permission to hold till next meeting. The pastoral relation between Anderson and Dr. Frierson was dissolved. The report of the executive committee of home missions, showed that the Presbytery owed about \$1,500 for work in that department. A resolution was passed urging all the churches to raise at least fifty cents per member to discharge this debt. The sessions continued until 11 a. m. Monday, when the Presbytery adjourned to meet at Liberty at 3 p. m., on Tuesday before the full moon in April. Limited space forbids further account of the proceedings at this time. The session was a most harmonious one, and the hospitality of the good people of Williamston will long be held in grateful remembrance by all the delegates. From Liberty. J. S. O'Neil will soon rebuild a nice cottage on the site of the one which was destroyed by fire this summer. Chapman & Calahan are adding about forty feet to their store. A fire broke out at 4 o'clock on Tuesday morning at the 4th inst., in the two-story brick building owned by J. B. Sifton and occupied by Edward Smith, a prominent merchant.
