The Amusement of Reading, says Sir Edgerton Brydges, "is among the greatest consolations of life; it is the nurse of virtue, the upholder of adversity, the prop of independence, the support of a just pride, the strengthoner of elevated opinions; it is a shield against the tyranny of all the petty passions; it is the repeller of the tool's scoff and the knave's poison." "If," says Sir John Herschol, "I were

to pray for a taste which would stand me in stead under every variety of cir-cumstance, and be a source of happi-ness and cheerfulness to me through life, and a shield against its ills, how ever things may go amiss and the world frown upon me, it would be a Taste for Reading. I speak of it, of course, only as a worldly advantage, and not in the slightest degree as superseding or derogaing from the higher offices, and surer and stronger panoply of religious principles, but as a taste, an instrument and a mode of pleasurable gratification. Give a man this taste and the means of gratifying it, and you can hardly fail of making a happy man, unless, indeed, you put in his hand a perverse selection of books. You place him in contact with the best society, in every period of history; with the wirest, wittiest, with the tenderest, the Bravest, and the purest characters who have adorned humanity; you may make him a denizen of all nations, a contemporary of all ages. The world has been created for him."

"A book, a love of reading, and education is," says Macaulay, "a companion which no misfortune can depress, no clime destroy, no enemy alienate, no despotism enslave. At home, a friend; abroad, an introduction ; in solitude, a solace; in society, an ornament. It shortens vice, it guides virtue, it gives at once grace and government to genius. Without it, what is man? A splendid slave! a reasoning savage! va illating between the dignity of an intelligence derived from God and the degradation of brutal passion."

Poetry and music are but expressions of that intense love of the beautiful which grows out of a communion of mind with mind. "All inmost things," says Carlyle, "are melodious, and naturally utter themselves in song. The meaning of song goes deep. The Greeks fabled of sphere harmonies; it was the feeling they had of the inner structure of nature, that the soul of all her voices and utterances was perfect music. Poetry therefore, we call musical thought. The poet is he who thinks in that manner. It turns still in on powers of intellect; it is man's sincerity and depth of vision that makes him a poet. 




