ORDERING ACCOUNTS. THE LEXINGTON MEETING. Good Work Done.

The correspondent of the Charleston Courier gives an encouraging account of the Lexington meeting. Threats and cajolery of the Ring kept many of the colored people away, but still a considerable number were present.

REV. JONAS BYRD AT NEWBERY

We extract from the columns of the Newberry Herald, a paper that is doing good service for Union and Reform, the following report of the speech of Rev. Jonas Byrd at Wadlington's. Let it be read to the colored people:

GENERAL BUTLER.

The applause elicited by Col. Thomas' eloquent address having subsided, the Chairman introduced General Butler, who, in the outset, expressed his sorrow at seeing so few of the colored people present.

He had been attacked by both sides in this controversy. The Sumter News, which had been probably bought by the Scott Ring, and some other contemptible magazine had accused him of going back on his principles.

Up to a very recent period we have had but little hope of seeing the defeat of the Radical party in South Carolina at the coming fall elections.

The Judge, in the course of his remarks, stated that he was an honest Republican, and that fact proved that he could never have had anything to do with the Scott Ring.

The Edgefield Advertiser of Aug. 11, whose patriotic columns are filled with words of encouragement and gratifying news for the Union Reform Party, makes mention of a visit to his home, by Gen. BUTLER, last week. It says:

ARRIVAL OF GUESTS.

The Charlotte train, which reached here at 8 o'clock, brought down the first installment of our guests. Almost every depot along the line of the road had its representatives from among the gallant yeomanry of the country.

THE OPENING SCENES.

At 8 o'clock, the city was a blaze of light, Market street being filled with a mass of human beings. The Conservative headquarters, corner Market and second streets, were handsomely hung with the tri colors, red, white and blue, and every window and cornice was adorned with gaily colored lanterns.

The procession was one of the grandest performances Wilmington has ever seen. All offensive transparencies or other proceedings calculated to offend, were left out of the occasion, and everything was conducted in the most dignified and conciliatory manner.
