Hampton last night as to his views concerning the proper course of Democrats in Congress. Hampton said: "I think it is not advisable to throw obstacles in the way of the decision of the commission. We submitted ur case to that tribunal, and if we have been deceived or hetrayed, we can better afford to suffer defeat which brings no dishonor anord to sutter deteat which brings no dishonor to our party, than to incur the imputation of acting in bad faith. Other legitlmate means of redress are still open to us without resorting to parliamentary tactics, which may injure the peace of the country, and would surely place us in a false position. The interest of the whole country demands a peaceful settlement of the pending question."
