TOWN ORDINANCE.

SEC. I. WHEREAS, the Board of Health for the Town of Union, on the 11th day of August, A. D. 1876, did report the storage of Commercial Fertilizers near residences in the town of Union as a nuisance, and as injurious to the public health;

Be it ordained by the Town Council of Union, that from and after the first day of March, A. D. 1877, no person or persons shall store or keep for sale Commercial Fertilizers of any description whatsoever within two hundred yards of any dwelling or any house actually occupied within the limits of the Town of Union.

SEC. II. That for violation of this Ordinance the person or persons so violating shall, upon trial and conviction thereof, be fined twenty dollars for each and every day he or they shall so store or keep for sale such Commercial Fertilizers, contrary to the provisions of Section 1 of this Ordinance.
