And a living example is found in Mr. Laurin's own town in the person of one of the ablest judges on the bench.

Col. Stackhouse was a good man. He was himself an honorable example of the "old South"—the old South, the old South Carolinian will object to any praise of Col. Stackhouse. It is the indecent, disgusting tirade against South Carolina that will make South Carolinians ashamed of Col. Stackhouse's successor.
