CAUTION FOR POULTRY.—This is the way I feed my care for sixty fowls, composed of two brown Leghorn cockerels, one-year old hens and pullets, mixtures of Leghorns and Wyandottes. Not a single day in two years wherein I have failed to get eggs, tells a story in the National Stockman of course in multiplying time they are very few. One pullet has already laid forty-two eggs, with no rest.

I keep them in their warm house during the winter, except on nice, warm days. For their breakfast I chop fine, one quart of meat scraps, one quart of some kind of vegetable; add to this nearly two quarts of corn meal, one quart of middling, one cup of molasses, one cup of sugar, one cup of yeast, one cup of lard, one cup of salt, one cup of sulphur, mixing well with hot water. Three quarts each at night. Their drink is quite warm water, also a half pan of scalded sour milk, given hot. I keep by them a barrel of sand, a pan of ground shells, also other things, such as three or four times a year, and occasional dressing in kerosene oil, and no vermin show themselves.

THIS IS OFFICIAL.—Lakewood, N. J., Feb. 14.—Mr. Cleveland officially announced the names of four members of his Cabinet, through the United Press this evening. They are: Walker R. Gresham, of Illinois, Secretary of State; John G. Carlisle, of Kentucky, Secretary of the Treasury; Daniel S. Lamont, of New York, Secretary of War; Wilson S. Bissel, of Buffalo, Postmaster General; Hoke Smith, of Georgia, Secretary of the Interior.

In making this announcement, Mr. Cleveland said: "There is no need of a mystery in regard to the Cabinet, and it is unnecessary to speculate and indulge in guess work. I shall make no secret of the matter, but shall announce the names of the gentlemen selected to fill the positions as fast as I receive their acceptances, and permission to make the matter public."

THE WEDDING OF BISHOP LYMAN.—Charleston, S. C., Feb. 9.—The wedding of Bishop Lyman to Miss Susan Robertson took place at St. Michael's church this morning. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. Dr. Pinckney of Grace church, who is the senior member of the standing committee of the diocese. The attendants were select, but not large. The bride was given away by Col. H. E. Young. She was attired in a traveling dress, and looked very handsome. From the church the happy couple were driven to the Charleston and Savannah railway depot, where they boarded a train for Florida. The honeymoon will embrace a residence of several weeks in Florida, a trip to Baltimore, whence they will return to the Episcopal residence in Raleigh, N. C. The age of the Bishop is 79 and that of the bride 45.
