Still later, and less than six months ago, the Gingham Mill makes an important extension and is now setting up 260 new looms, making its entire number 500. Then, before this work is completed, the Charlotte Cotton Mills are found to have perfected all their arrangements, purchased machinery and have in process of construction an important extension, consisting of new buildings, new machinery and the employment of mere labor. The new looms will be run on white cloth and employment will be given to 65 or 100 people, mostly white goods weavers. goods weavers.

The contracts for almost all the machinery

were placed right here in Charlotte.
