ORDINANCE FOR SUPPLIES.
 BE it ordained by the Town Council of Union, in the State of South Carolina, now met and sitting, and by authority of the people:

Sec. 1. That a tax of 2 mills upon every dollar of the value of all Real Estate, personal property and stock in trade is hereby levied to meet the ordinary expenses of the Municipal Government of the said town for the fiscal year commencing the 1st day of May, 1894.

Sec. 2. That a tax of 2 mills upon every dollar of the value of all Real Estate, personal property and stock in trade is hereby levied to meet the interest on school bonds during the fiscal year beginning 1st of May, 1894.

Sec. 3. That a tax of 3 mills upon every dollar of the value of all Real Estate, personal property and stock in trade is hereby levied to meet the interest on school bonds during the fiscal year beginning 1st of May, 1894.

Sec. 4. That the sum of three (\$3) Dollars be and is a commutation for street or road duty, said tax to be paid by each and every able-bodied male person between the age of eighteen (18) and fifty (50) years, who reside or labor within the corporate limits of said town.

Sec. 5. That the Town Clerk and Treasurer do proceed at once to collect the taxes herein provided for, and that he shall keep his books open from the first (1st) day of May next until the first (1st) day of June, 1894, after which time he shall proceed by distress or otherwise as prescribed by law to collect such taxes, and with a penalty of twenty (20) per cent said sums of collection added.

Sec. 6. That the books of value for the taxation of Real Estate, personal property and stock in trade shall be taken from the assessments as made by the County Auditor in February 1894.

Sec. 7. License fees shall be for the said fiscal year (no allowance to be made for any part of said year) as follows:

TOWN ORDINANCE.
 TOWN OF UNION,
 COUNCIL CHAMBER.
 An ordinance relating to Bawdy and disorderly houses:

Sec. 1. Be it ordained that the keeping of any Bawdy or disorderly house, room or tenement in the Town of Union shall be unlawful and shall be punished by a fine of not exceeding Twenty Dollars or Thirty days imprisonment, or both in the discretion of the Council, for each and every offence; and for the purpose of this ordinance after each and every conviction any continuance of the keeping of any such house shall constitute a new offence.

Sec. 2. Be it further ordained that the renting of any house, room or tenement in the town of Union to be used as a Bawdy or disorderly house, room or tenement, or the continued renting and allowing of any house, room or tenement to be so used after notice, or knowledge that it is so used, for more than five days shall be unlawful and shall be punished by a fine of not more than Twenty dollars, or imprisonment for not more than thirty days, or both, in the discretion of the Council, for each and every offence; and for the purpose of this ordinance any so renting or any continued allowance of occupation by parties so using said house, room, or tenement for more than five days after each and every conviction of either of the offences described in this section, shall constitute a new offence.
