There was some conflict of opinion between the Dutch Government and Count Bismarck on that score, but the latter showed very little of his ordinary imperiousness in his dealings with Holland, and satisfied with the possession of the fortress, professed his willingness to adjourn the settlement of any other points in dispute.

The Republican Party and their Alleged Friendship for the Colored Race. It may not be amiss at the present time, when efforts are being made to array the colored race against those with whom their lot has been cast, and to claim for the Radical Republican party a title to their affiliation, to recall somewhat of the past.

In September, 1858, he delivered a speech at Charleston, Illinois, in which he expressed his convictions on many of the very questions which are now pending. He says: 'I will say that I am not, nor ever have been, in favor of making voters or jurors of negroes, nor of qualifying them to hold office, nor to intermingle with white people; and I will say, in addition to this, that there is a physical difference between the white and black races which I believe will forever forbid the two races living together on terms of social and political equality.'

This was the doctrine avowed by the Head of the Republican party. If they have departed from it, it is not from any sincerity of conviction, or real abiding friendship for the colored race, but simply to use them as the instruments of their own aggrandizement, and to enable them by their votes to overthrow self government, in the very States and among the very people with whom the lives of the colored race are to be passed, and upon harmony with whom their livelihood and future depends.

Recommendation and Nomination of Registers in Bankruptcy. The following has been issued by the Clerk of the United States Supreme Court:

By direction of the Chief Justice, the following statement is published for information: First—Under the act of Congress the power of appointing Registers in Bankruptcy is vested in the District Courts of the United States, the Supreme Courts of the Territories, and the Supreme Court of the District of Columbia; but no person can be appointed who is not a counsellor at law.

Second—The duty of recommending and nominating to the District Courts, and other courts mentioned in the act, suitable persons for appointment, is imposed on the Chief Justice of the United States and Congress having now adjourned without acting upon the bill introduced into the Senate to repeal this provision, he will proceed to carry it into effect.

Fourth—In addition to these, when the State is represented in Congress, similar letters, if they can be had, are desired from the Representative of the District, and from the Senators of the State, or in the case of a Territory, from the delegate.

Another Order. The following order has been issued by the Military Authorities: HEADQUARTERS, 2d MILITARY DISTRICT, Charleston, S. C., April 20, 1867.

The Military Post of Aiken, to embrace the State Districts of Barnwell and Edgefield; to be commanded by Brevet Major L. Walker, Captain 5th Cavalry. Headquarters at Aiken, S. C.; Garrison: Companies 11 and 1, 5th Cavalry.

The Military Post of Columbia to embrace the State Districts of Orangeburg, Sumter, Kershaw, Richland and Lexington; to be commanded by Brevet Brigadier-General J. D. Greeng, Colonel 6th Infantry. Headquarters at Columbia, S. C.; Garrison: Companies B, C and E, 6th Infantry.

The Military Post of Charleston to embrace the State Districts of Charleston and Edgefield; to be commanded by Brevet Major L. Walker, Captain 5th Cavalry. Headquarters at Charleston, S. C.; Garrison: Companies 11 and 1, 5th Cavalry.

The attention of Post Commanders is called to General Orders Nos. 7, 15 (paragraphs VIII, IX and X), 21 and 42, series of 1866, Headquarters Department of the South, and paragraph 467 of the Revised Regulations for the Army of 1863.

The following named officers, in addition to their other duties, have been assigned in orders from the War Department, as Assistant Commissioners of the Bureau of Refugees, Freedmen and Abandoned Lands, within the limits of this command:

Brevet Major-General R. K. Scott, for South Carolina, Headquarters at Charleston, S. C. Brevet Major-General N. A. Miles, Colonel 4th Infantry, for North Carolina, Headquarters at Raleigh, N. C.

Commanding officers will, as heretofore, in compliance with existing orders, extend all proper facilities and protection to the officers and agents of the Bureau of Refugees, Freedmen and Abandoned Lands, in the discharge of their duties.

Post Commanders, on the application of the Commissioner or Assistant Commissioner of the Bureau, will, in addition to their present duties, assume the duties of Sub-Assistant Commissioners of the Bureau for the territory included within the limits of their post, respectively.

All officers charged with the care of public property, or the disbursement of public money, will render to the Chief of the respective Staff Departments on duty at these Headquarters such reports, returns, accounts, &c., as they may require in order to enable them fully to carry out under the direction of the Commanding General, the requirements of General Order No. 98, series of 1866, and Article XLI of the Revised Regulations for the Army of 1863.

IX. Requisitions for supplies will be sent by Commanders of Posts to the proper Staff Department.

The sale of spirituous liquors by any person or persons to soldiers, sailors or marines in the service of the United States, is hereby prohibited; and any person so offending, procuring for, or giving away to any soldier, sailor or marine any spirituous, will be brought to trial before a military tribunal, and shall be fined in a sum not exceeding one hundred nor less than fifty dollars, or imprisoned for a period not exceeding two months. Any person giving information of any violation of this order shall, upon conviction of the person accused, be entitled to receive one-fourth of the fine imposed and collected.

Post Commanders will require Sheriff, Deputy Sheriffs, Constables and the police force within their commands to report to them any violation of military orders and arrest the guilty parties.

Post Commanders will exercise a supervision over all Magistrates, Sheriffs, Deputy Sheriffs, Constables, and Police within their commands; and will, whenever necessary for the preservation of order and the efficient discharge of their duties, assume command of the police force.
