LOCAL ITEMS.

SATURDAY MORNING, MAY 11, 1867.

Registration.
General SICKLES has issued an order for Registration under the Military Acts, to take place on the third Monday in July next. The Board of Registration will remain in session two days, from sunrise until sunset.

Salesday.

A Narrow Escape.
Mr. S. W. Sullivan and three others engaged in the construction of a dwelling house for T. E. Rickenbaker, and had it raised, and under cover, though not weather-boarded, for want of material. At mid-day on Tuesday last, they were eating dinner inside the frame, under cover of the roof; when a sudden gust of wind came up, and without giving the party any warning, blew the frame to the earth in a few seconds. The timbers fell all around them, and the shingling covered them up, so that some had to be drawn out by the neighbors, who came to their assistance; yet strange to say, none were seriously hurt, and only one of the four was much bruised from the accident.

District Court.
The May Session was held during four days of the present week, Judge LEGARE presiding. The following is a list of the principal cases tried, and the sentences imposed:
The State vs. James Batten.—Grand Larceny. GUILTY. Sentenced to two years' imprisonment.
The State vs. Ben Hair (colored).—Grand Larceny. GUILTY. Sentenced to six years' imprisonment. This was an aggravated case.
The State vs. Adam Shuler (colored).—Petit Larceny. GUILTY. Sentenced to six months' imprisonment.
The State vs. Smart McGrew (colored).—Petit Larceny. GUILTY. Sentenced to three months' imprisonment and labor in District Jail.
The State vs. Mose Livingston (colored).—Petit Larceny. GUILTY. Sentenced to three months' imprisonment, and labor.
The State vs. Adam Snider (colored).—Hog Stealing. GUILTY. Sentenced to one month's imprisonment.
The State vs. Adam Trimmis (colored).—

Petit Larceny. GUILTY. Sentenced to six months' imprisonment.
State vs. Amos Gardner (colored).—Assault and Battery. GUILTY. Sentenced to a fine ten dollars or one month's imprisonment.
State vs. Henry Grant (colored).—Assault and Battery. GUILTY OF ASSAULT. Sentenced to six months' imprisonment.
State vs. Tom Scroven (colored).—Assault and Battery. NOT GUILTY.
In all of the above sentences for a longer term than three months, provision is made for the transfer of the convicted parties to the penitentiary as soon as they can be there accommodated, where they are to be put at hard labor, for the portion of their term unexpired at the time of the transfer.
We hope that the results of this session of the District Court will have a salutary effect upon the evil-disposed in our District, and will teach them that punishment will surely follow the commission of crime. The Court adjourned on Thursday last.

In accordance with the recent Changes made in the Internal Revenue Law, all Special Taxes, (previously called Licenses,) as also Incomes for 1866, (Carriages, Billiard Tables, Plate, of either Gold or Silver and Watches, are to be returned immediately. Unless returned within time specified by law a penalty of ten per centum, will be added. Persons neglecting to make returns for any business or occupation for which a Special Tax (or License) is imposed, are liable to a fine of \$500.


