It has been discovered that by grinding tea in the same manner as coffee, before infusion, the quantity of exhilarating fluid obtained is nearly doubled.

Items.

The Masonic procession in Boston contained 8,899 Masons in full regalia, and 40 bands of music, with 450 musicians.

In clearing out a reservoir at St. Louis used for supplying the city with water, the bodies of thirty-three children were found.

It is reported that cholera has appeared at Greenwood, Miss., on the Yazoo River. Over thirty negroes have died, but no cases yet among the whites.

Ex-Senator B. H. Hall delivered a speech at Atlanta, recently. He takes decided grounds against reconstruction under the military bill, and advises the people to reject the terms.

Ex-Gov. Johnson has written a letter advising the people of Georgia not to accept the terms of the military reconstruction acts, and says: "I hope every man in Georgia who can register will do so, with a view of defeating the scheme of our degradation."

Twenty thousand Swiss women earn a comfortable living by watchmaking. They make the movements, and mostly put them together. A few women are finishers. The *English Woman's Review* says: "Geneva has refused to employ women, and totally lost the watch trade. None of the so-called Geneva watches are made there, but in Neuchâtel, where women have always been employed."

Among the papers captured at Queretaro, it has been ascertained, was a letter from Miramon to Maximilian, protesting against the appointment of Marquez to a military rank higher than his own. Marquez was, however, appointed to such a rank, and this rivalry between himself and Miramon, taken in connection with other matters, leads to the belief that Marquez really was not loyal to Maximilian.

A shocking tragedy occurred near Union City, Odin county, Ky., on Monday. A negro man broke jail in that town on the preceding Friday, repairing to the house of an aged and highly respected widow lady, named Charam, outraged her, and then fled. Two sons of the injured woman followed the wretch to Hickman, Ky., arrested him, and, taking him back to near the scene of the outrage, shot him dead, and then severed his head from his body.

A marriage recently took place, in Fayetteville, N. C., of a white man, named Thornton to a negro woman. Previous to the performance of the ceremony, application was made to General Sickles for an order legalizing the same. The General accorded the requisite permission and authority for the marriage to take place, but it was accompanied with an express disapprobation of such an unusual proceeding.

Information from Florida states, says the Washington correspondent of the *New York Times*, that the late Republican Union Convention held at Tallahassee was a decided success, and that the platform adopted embraced a most unequivocal endorsement of the reconstruction policy of Congress. When the Convention was first organized considerable sectional jealousy was evinced between the delegates from Eastern and Middle Florida, but before the adjournment all differences were healed and the greatest unanimity of feeling prevailed.

A watchmaker of Washington, D. C., has just completed a fine chronometer watch, intended as a present from President Johnson to the Tyecon of Japan. The watch is a most beautiful piece of workmanship. It is a hunting case of the finest eighteen carat gold, very thick and heavy. On the inside of the lid is the following inscription: "To His Majesty the Tyecon of Japan, from the President of the United States, 1867." The works are of the finest kind, and the watch is jewelled throughout. The style of chain has not yet been selected.

SURRATT'S FATE—A PIECE OF SUIT.—Forney's *Chronicle* has let off the following spiteful paragraph: "One of our evening contemporaries is nervous about the fate of Surratt. There need be no alarm on his account. Nobody expects him to be found guilty in this city, under the present arrangements for selecting a jury. We have no doubt Washington is eminently loyal. But the 'Lost Cause' has enough friends here to secure at least one member of any jury that may be empanelled to try Surratt. That one member is as good as a dozen, so far as defeating a verdict of 'guilty' is concerned. Neither Surratt nor anybody else is ever likely to be punished in this city for aiding the rebellion, whether as an assassin of the nation's President or as a Confederate spy and blockade-runner. Surratt is more likely to get a clerkship in one of the Departments in a few weeks than he is to be hanged for his crime."
