

Shall Negroes, and not Women, Vote?

AGRICULTURAL, & C. Experiments in Feeding Cattle.

In England everything connected with agriculture is experimented in, without regard to expense, in every possible way. In no country has the cultivation of the soil been carried to a higher state of perfection, or in which it is more productive, and as an occupation, more lucrative. We always read with pleasure the results of farming, and especially the many experiments which are tried there with a view to discover the most successful and profitable way of conducting the various operations on the farm.

The following experiment in feeding cattle with cooked and with fermented food, was lately tried upon one of the largest estates. It will be seen that this experiment suggests the importance of great care and caution in feeding, before a decided opinion is adopted in so nice and delicate a subject as the nutrition of animals, the health and constitution of which is so various.

Four heifers were selected, as equal in all respects as possible; and six pigs were also selected, from the same family; each lot was divided by the selection, alternately, of an animal. All were weighed, and at the end of each week during the experiment each animal was weighed. In the first week of the experiment the fermented food consumed was much less than the other, and the increase of the pigs in live weight is considerable more; and the heifers also seemed to have made rapid advances.

Knowing as we do that there is a considerable difference of opinion among farmers upon this question, the above is submitted to their attention in the hope that they will give us their own views upon the subject, which is one, they will all admit, worthy of consideration.—Germania Telegraph.
