Political economy as bich every man has in his labor. In all the putruits of industry we readily acknowledge this claim and meet the demands. In all these pursuits every man has a right to set a price on his labor, and those who will, may avail themselves of his services at that price or do without his hid. There is no reason why these principles should not be maintained in the Ministry. The Church of God ought to insist everywhere that it is a duty to sustain the workmen of the Lord and not a charity. Concributions made to this cause are not gifts, but the payment of delits we owe to the Highest Power, especially in the Methodist Church, when be it remembered, that the Ministry have voluntarily surrendered the right to fix their salaries. It becomes not only a religious duty, but a debt of honor for a Methodist to pay his preacher.

We recommend for the more efficient action in the future, that the Stewards meet in the beginning of the year, make a liberal allowance for the support of the ministers, and diwide this amount among the different Churches. Then we recommend that each Church elect a Committee who shall assess every member according to their ability. Whenever it is practicable let the Stewards elect one of their body to visit the Churches and set forth to them the claims of the ministry and urge the people to rally to their support.

We are sorry to report so large a difficiency sat this time in our District. The various as sessments amount to \$9.000, of this amount auly \$2,159,42 have been collected, leaving to be raised 86.846,58. As the time is now short. only two months and a hulf to Conference, it is evident the most vigorous efforts must be made, or our pastors will suffer. Let every charge band every man and woman come up to the help of the Stewards in this work.

The Committee on the State of the Church bog leave respectfully to report.

We have heard, with deep interest, the re-Poportrof othe Pastors of the several charges within the District, on their separate fields of labor, and it is with gratitude and devout thanks-"igiving to Almighty God, that we record that the Church, throughout the District, is in a sound condition, that success has crowned the efforts of the ministry, and that at several points God has been pleased abundantly to mpour out His spirit, and to bring many into the "Church, and to a saving knowledge of sins for-

The desclations of war, the destruction of some of our Church edifices and class books. - and the great loss of property, consequent upon the March of the Federal army through a porotion of the District near the close of the war so impoverished and demoralized our arrange ments as well as our people for a time, that the prospect was indeed gloomy for the future of the Church. We would urge an increase of effort in this direction also, for there are many Sabbath school children still without instruction.

The Literature of the Church .- Our books and periodicals are receiving some attention, but not as much as we desire. We hope to be able to give that interest more attention in the future, as the harvest has come and the Lord has blest the laborer's toil. The religious state of our colored population is rather an indefinable ine, but still, they as a people, seem retigiously inclined, and have services regularly. Some still eling to the old church, but many have been drawn away, and gone they know not where. Many of them as regards denomiand we believe, that with proper management, others will see their error and pursue the same course. For further information on the subjects'herein embraced, your committee would

The Committee to whom was referred this interest beg leave to report.

Your Committee have had this subject be-fore them, and find that it occupies a place in our Church system that it did not in years past. It is now supprintended by a "Methodist Sunday School Society" with its "Board of Managers"; but it is organic in our system. This is shewn by the fact, that a Superintendent of a Sunday School, a member of our Church is a Member of the high Court of Appeals, the Quarterly Conference. The discipline requires reports to be made by the Church officers to her judicatories that the Church may have this subject always under her control and oversight. This arrangement is in accordance with our religious faith. We believe in infant redemption-infant membership-and the Sunday school embraces infant instruction and training, so that any interest or action in reference to Sunday School is in referonce to a substantial part of our religion and its outward manifestation.

Like other branches of this great saving system it has its difficulties, and some of them are peculiar to us . When devastating armies over-ran our country, and occupied our Churches, they scattered our Sunday School books away far and wide, and in some cases. even took the pulpit books away from their cushions, and having desolated our fields it has left many of our Schools destitute of books.

There has been such a want of teachers as to some extent to damage our Sunday-School cause. To reform the old and hardened sinner-to break the voke of sinful bondage which has been fastened on the neck of the old four scores of years; to force in the heads and hearts of those who have entertained ignorance and superstition, knowledge and the love of God, duty to Him might indeed be discouraging; but to find a backwardness in teaching, guiding, leading dear young precious children in the sweetness and simplicity of childhood is a fault we ought not to find in any who believe our dectrines, or who look to the future with interestary symmetry

There have been some cases where there have been men and women ready to teach but the attendance of children could not be secured. Parents did not feel that they needed the help of the Church to train up their children in the nurture and admonition of the Lord." They admitted that they, the parents, needed the Church by joining it; but their children did not. Reversing the order of nature, sending the old to school, for the Church is Christ School on earth, and letting the children go without; SAMORT

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
