The Cotton Tax.—We make the follow-
 ing extract from the Columbia Journal:
 The Comptroller General of the State has
 instructed tax officers to include in their quar-
 terly assessments all cotton purchased and sold
 by merchants, factors, brokers, bankers, or
 other persons buying or shipping on commis-
 sion, or otherwise, which was grown this year,
 and is exempt from tax by the United States
 Government by Act of Congress and to collect
 twenty cents on every hundred dollars worth
 of it, the same as on other merchandize, con-
 sidering cotton sold whenever it is shipped.
