On Friday, the 29th ult., the first day of the week, now under review, our market opened weak, and prices fell off for last week's quotations, Middling 14 1/2. On Saturday and Monday, there was a fair demand, with a downward tendency in prices, particularly on the lower grades. The market on Tuesday continued weak, and closed at a decline of 1/2 c. A better feeling prevailed on Wednesday, and buyers bought freely in some instances at 1/2 advance in prices of the day before. On Thursday there was a good demand, with an improvement of 1/2 c. The sales for the week amount to 4,600 bales. We quote:
