COURT HOUSE—

On the 2nd instant the County Com-  
missioners met for the purpose of con-  
sidering the advisability of taking steps  
towards commencing work on the Court  
House for this County, at an early day.  
Mr. Ralph E B Hewetson, the archi-  
tect of the Columbia Court House, was  
present, and was authorized to draft a  
plan for the same, which is to be sub-  
mitted to the Board in a week or ten  
days. The building is to be fifty feet  
wide and one hundred feet long, and  
not to exceed a cost of twenty-five  
thousand dollars. We hope the work  
will be commenced at an early day.  
Our County is wealthy and we should  
have a Court House to which we can  
point to with pride.
