SENATE.

The Senate met at 10 A. M. The President pro tem. announced that Ir. Richardson was added to the Comnittee on Roads and Buildings.

Mr. Townes offered a resolution, which was agreed to, that it be referred to the judiciary committee to report as to the propriety of passing a law for the protection of the property of married women in this . State, and that they have leave to report by bill or other-

The Senate proceeded to the special order for 11 o'clock—a bill to establish District Courts.

The hour having arrived, the President pro tem. of the Senate, attended by the officers and members of the Senate, attended in the House of Representatives, in order to be present at the inauguration of the Lieutenant Governor lect, who was sworn in by the Hon. B. F. Dunkin, Chief Justice.

Immediately thereafter, the Senate joined the House of Representatives in voting for two Associate Justices of the Court of Appeals.

Resolved, That it be referred to a joint committee, to consist of the committee of Ways and Means of the House, and the committee of Finance and Banks of the Senate, to take immediate steps to provide for the expenses of the General As sembly the present session, and that they especially inquire and report as to the expediency of authorizing the President and Directors of the Bank of the State of South Carolia, to advance to the use of the State, from any funds now in their possession or under their control, a sum sufficient for said purpose, upon the pledge of the faith and credit of the State for the repayment of the same to the said President and Directors.

The Senate attended in the House, and United with the House in voting viva voce for two Associate Justices of the Appeal Court.

Hon. D. L. Wardlaw and Hon. John A. Inglis hiving received a majority of the votes given, the Speaker announced that they were elected Associate Justices of the Appeal Court.


