ARTICLE I.

Section 1. The Legislative authority of this State shall be vested in a General Assembly, which shall consist of a Senate and a House

of Representatives.

Section 2. The House of Representatives shall be composed of Members chosen by ballot, every second year, by the citizens of this State, qualified as in this Constitution is provided.

SECTION 3. Each Judicial District in the

Section 3. Each Judicial District in the State shall constitute one Election District, except Charleston District, which shall be divided into two Election Districts, one consisting of the late Parishes of St. Phillip and St. Michael, to be designated the Election District of Charleston; the other consisting of all that part of the Judicial District, which is without the limits of said Parishes, to be Known as the Election District of Berkeley.

Section 4. The boundaries of the several Judicial and Election Districts shall remain as they are now established.

Section 5. The House of Representatives shall evaluated in the manning of the supportioned among the several Election Districts of the State, according to the number of white inhabitants contained in each, and the amount of all taxes raised by the General Assembly, whether direct or indirect, or of whatever species paid in each, deducting therefrom all taxes paid on account of property held in any other District. An esumitration of the white inhabitants, for this purpose, was made if the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty nice, and shall be made in the course of every tenth year thereafter, in such manner as shall be, by law, directed; and Representatives shall be assigned to the different Districts in the above-mentioned proportion, by Act of the General Assembly at the session immediately succeeding every enumeration; Provided, That until the apportionment, which shall be made upon the next enumeration, shall take effect, the representatives which has been heretofore divided into smaller Districts, shown as Parishes, having the aggregate number of Representatives which the Parishes heretofore embraced within its limits have had since that apportionment, the Representative to which the Parishes heretofore embraced with its limits have had since that apportionment, the Representative to which the Parishes heretofore embraced with the surface of the year appointed for the purpose, it shall be the

SECTION 12. Section 22. Every Act or Resolution having the force of law shall relate to but one subject, and that shall be expressed in the title.

The Governor shall reside, during the sitting of the General Assembly, at the plade where its session may be held; and the General Assembly may by law, require him to reside at the "apitol of the State, Section 21. Every Bill which shall have passed the General Assembly, shall, before it become a law, he presented to the Governor, if he approve, he shall sign it; but if not, he shall return it, with his objections, to that House in which it shall have originated, who shall enter the objections at large on their journal; and proceed to reconsider it. In all elections to be made by the people of this State, or of any part thereof, for civil or political offices, every person shall be entitled to vote, who has the following qualifications,

to wit i He shall be a free white man, who has attain ed the ago of twesty-one years, and is not a pauper, nor a non commissioned officer or pri-vate soldier of the army, nor a seaman or ma-

rine of the navy of the United States. He shall, for the two years next preceding the day of election, have been a citizen of the State, or, for the same period, an emigrant from Europe, who has declared his intention to become a citizen of the United States, according to the Constitution and Lawa of the United States. He shall have resided in this State for at least two years next preceding the day of election, and, for the last six months of that time, in the District in which he offers to vote, prouded, however. That the General Assembly, may, by requiring a registry of voters, or other suitable legislation, guard against francis in elections, and usurpations of the right of suffrage, may impose disqualification to vote as a punishment for crime, and may prescribe additional qualifications for voters in municipal elections.

ARTICLE V.

All persons, who shall be elected or appointed to any office of profit or trust, before entering on the execution thereof, shall take (besides

on the execution thereof, shall take (hesides special oaths, not repughant to this Constitution, prescribed by the General Assembly.) the following oath:

"I do swear (or affirm) that I am duly qualified, according to the Constitution of this State, to exercise the office to which I have been appointed, and that I will, to the beat of my ability, discharge the duties thereof, and preserve, protect and defend the Constitution of this State, and that of the United States. So help me God."

ARTICLE VI.

Section 1. The House of Representatives shall have the sole power of impeaching, but no unpeachment shall be made, unless with the concurrence of two-thirds of the House of

the concurrence of two-thirds of the House of Representatives

Section 2. All impeachments shall be tried by the Senate. When sitting for that purpose the Senators shall be on eath or affirmation, and no person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

SECTION 3. The Governor. Lieutenant-Gov SECTION 3. The Governor. Licutemant-Governor, and all eivil officers, shall be liable to impeachment for high crimes and misdemeanors, for any misbehavier in office, for corruption in procuring office, or for any act which shall degrade their official character. But judgment in such cases shall not extend further than to removal from office, and disquallification to hold any office of bonor, trust or p. ofit under this State. The party convicted shall, nevertheless, be liable to indictment, trial, judgment and punishment according to trial, judgment and punishment according

SECTION 5. If any civil officer shall become disabled from discharging the duties of his office, by reason of any permanent hadily or mental infirmity, his office may be declared to be vacant, by joint resolution, agreed to by two-thirds of the whole representation in each flouse of the General Assembly: Provided. That such resolution shall contain the grounds for the proposed removal, and before it shall for the proposed removal, and before it shall pass either House, a copy of it shall be served on the officer, and a hearing be allowed blin.

SECTION 1 All power is originally invested the people, and all free Governments are founced on their authority, and are instituted for their peace, satety and happinezs.

SECTION 2. No person shall be taken, or imprise ed, for disseized of his freehold, liberties or privileges, or outlawed or exiled, or in any mahner deprived of his life, liberty or property, but by due process of law nor shall any bill of attainder, expost facto law, or the law impairing the obligation of contracts, ever be naised by the General Assembly.

SECTION 3. The inflitary shall be subordinate by the civil power.

Section 4 The privilege of the writ of habeas corpus shall not be suspended, unless when, in corpus shall not be suspended, unless when, in case of rebellion or invasion, the public safety require it.

ECTION 5. Excessive bail shall not be re-

SECTION 5. Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel punishment inflicted.

SECTION 6. The General Assembly shall not grant any title of nobility, or heredifary distinction, nor create any office, the appointment to which shall be for any longer time than during good behavior.

SECTION 7. The trial by jury, as beretofore used in this State, and the liberty of the press, shall be forever inviolably preserved. But the General Assembly shall have power to determine the number of persons who shall constitute the jury in the Inferior or District Courts

SECTION S. The free exercise and enjoymen SECTION 5. The free exercise and enjoyment of religious profession and worship, without discrimination or preference, shall be allowed within this State, to all mankind: Provided, That the liberty of conscience hereby declared shall not be construed as to excus acts of licentiousness, or justify practices inconsistent with the peace and safety of the State.

SECTION 9 The rights, privileges, immunities add estates of both civil and religious societies and of corporate bodies, shall remain as if the Constitution of this State had not been altered or amended.

SECTION 10. The rights of primogeniture shall not be re-established, and there shall not fail to be some legislative provision for the equitable distribution of the estates of intestates.
