Our Standard-Bearers.

To the entire country, from Maine to California, the re-nomination of Greeley and Brown, by the National Democratic Convention, commends itself as a most auspicious event, and will be hailed as the harbinger of better days by every lover of reform and good government, be he Democrat or Republican. With almost perfect unanimity, the Democracy have accepted the hand of peace and reconciliation proffered them by the assemblage of honest Republicans at Cincinnati, and to accomplish the great aim of reform, it only remains for these two elements to throw into the campaign their whole energies and resources, and by a united effort on their part, the overthrow of corruption and despotism can be easily effected.

The action of the Democratic party in their National Convention, is entirely satisfactory, we believe, to three fifths of the voters of the Union, and meets with the approval of nine-tenths of the members of the party. The tendency of the times demanded such action, and we rejoice to know that this demand has been so fully and completely satisfied. The voice of the people called for the nomination of Greeley and Brown, and it has been heeded. The work has been well done, and quickly done, in a statesmanlike and dignified manner, and the issue now squarely presented to the country is whether corruption shall continue to rule, or reform achieve a triumph. Shall Grant, the miserable demagogue, be again chosen to preside over the destinies of this great nation, or shall Horace Greeley, the honest incorruptible patriot, be elevated to a position which has been granted, except in the past few years, by men who guarded most sacredly our grand old constitution, and defended from insult the honor of our flag? This question must be answered one way or the other by the people. There are no side issues. Every path that leads from Greeley inevitably goes in the direction of Grantism, and every man who does not vote for Greeley, gives that much support to Grant. The contest is now definitely narrowed down between these two personages, and admits of no other departure.

We nail to our mast-head to-day the names of Greeley and Brown. We have previously committed ourselves to their cause, but as the representative of a Democratic people, and privileged to speak in their behalf, we refrained from a popular expression of preferences until the voice of the party had gone forth.

In the present campaign we can scarcely hope to carry this State for the "National Reform" candidates, but we can accomplish much by a course shaped in the interests of peace and moderation, making thereby no capital which might be effectively used against us by our wily and unscrupulous enemies. Our advice, then to our people, if we may be permitted to offer it, is to eschew politics altogether for the present, remain peaceably at home, and pursue their usual avocations, in the endeavor to build up their material interests, and advance the prosperity of our own State. We are powerless to help the friends of reform, and we had better act so as not to do anything that would jeopardize the cause, in the success of which there is everything for our ultimate good. If our moral support

can be of avail in securing a victory for Greeley, let us by all means give it without stint. In his election is our only political salvation, and lies the event of his defeat, we must prepare ourselves to receive the malignity of a vindictive and tyrannical administration.

The friends of Dr. Greeley will be pleased to hear that the White House is undergoing repairs. It is to be hoped that everything will be put in apple-pie order for the great farmer's installation in March next. No vestige of illegal military occupation will be allowed to remain, and the servants, will have to lay off their tawdry liveries if they desire to have the privilege of brushing the famous old white hat.
