**Terrible Accident.**

END OF TRACK, C. & O. R. R., WEST VIRGINIA July 11.

While the construction train on the Cheapeake and Ohio Railroad was passing over a temporary bridge which spans the Greenbrier River about fifteen miles west of the White Sulphur Springs, the bridge gave way and the entire train was precipitated into the river below. Engineer Hill and the fireman whose name is unknown, were instantly killed, as were also about thirty track layers and a great many wounded. The engineer "Davy" Anderson, is now lying at the bottom of Greenbrier River.

**LATER.**

The accident occurred at 8 o'clock this morning. The engineer and fireman Parker of Albemarle county are killed. Mr. Myers, a citizen and a Mr. Perkins are badly injured. Five negroes were killed out-right and four or five mortally wounded.

**From New York.**

NEW YORK, July 11—Evening.—There was an earthquake at 5.30, this morning, in some points of Long Island and on the Hudson.

The committee to inform Greeley of his nomination will meet to-night to fix the time.

An adjourned meeting of the South Carolina bond-holders was held to-day. The object of the meeting was to take concerted and immediate action to compel the payment of accrued and unpaid interest on the bonds of that State. The meeting was much larger in numbers than the one previously held, not less than \$4,000,000 of bonds being represented. The following resolution was presented:

Resolved, That a committee of three persons, to consist of E. A. Quintard, E. B. Wesley and A. A. Drake, be appointed to solicit the co-operation of the owners and holders of bonds of the State of South Carolina in the attempt to collect the past due coupons, with authority to engage counsel to commence legal proceedings against the officers of the State, or its legal Financial Board; also, to raise funds by subscription to promote such proceedings without delay.

Be it further resolved, That all parties interested be earnestly requested to assist said committee by an early subscription as possible.

A substitute clothes the committee only with power to confer with bond-holders not here present, and report the results at some future meeting; and further, that the Chair appoint the committee, himself to be a member. The substitute prevailed. The committee was authorized to collect subscriptions for legal expenses. On motion, the committee was further empowered to employ eminent counsel, after which the meeting adjourned till Thursday next.
