The Charges Against State Senator Andrews.

Ex-County Treasurer Humbert, who was prested as a defaulter to the Stare, and is now in Orangeburg jail awaiting trial upon an action brought against him for the recovery of county funds alleged to have been collected by him, gave to a reporter for the News and Courier, on Christ mas Eve, a decai ed statement of the causes of his delinquency. This was published yesterday, and may be summed up as follows:

Humbert, who is a colored man, Treasur r at the instance of Senator Sate funds in the name of Andrew's went into his (Humbert's)leffice and helped himselffrom the cash drawer. to the County Commissioners that the South and the North. no money of the county had been received, which was not true; that Audrews collected public money without authority, and gave receipts Autrews paid his store accounts with orders, which he compelled Hamberi to receive in payment of taxes; that Andrews obtained from Hambert receipts for taxes,on which receipts no money has ever been paid; that Andrews, having Humbert completely in his power, forced him to give him what money he wanted : that An irews, and Andrews only, is the cause of Humbert's defalcation. This defaleation is said to amount to about \$25,000, and Humber, gives a list of particular sums, amounting to bearly \$19,000, which Andrews obtained
