A hand-bill reached here Saturday afternoon from Bennettsville giving a full description of the mare found in the possession of John Williams, the negro who was taken up on suspicion a few days ago. The mare is the property of Mr. T. F. McRae, who will no doubt be here to-day to take charge of the thief and to recover his property.

Amanda Bates, colored, was arrested Saturday for bigamy. It seems that Amanda wanted too many husbands, but the one she married did not agree with her and caused her to be arrested and lodged in jail. This is the first instance of the kind that has ever occurred here. There have been cases tried where women indicted men for bigamy, but never has there been a case where a man indicted a woman until now.

A parade of the Fairfield Fire Engine Company is ordered for this afternoon at 4 o'clock. We trust that the members of the company will turn out in full force. On the drags belong the most active and energetic young men of our town, and they being the custodians of the citizens' money invested in their engine, should not, through lack of zeal, allow the organization to "go stone dead."

ARRESTED ON SUSPICION.—A rather fancy looking darkey, hailing last from Louisville, Ky., was arrested in town yesterday by Policeman Murphy, under suspicion of being in possession of a stolen horse. The suspicion was excited by his evasive answers, and the manner of traveling through the country. Justice Robertson will investigate the case to-day.

We learn that quite a serious accident occurred on the Charlotte, Columbia and Augusta Railroad Wednesday afternoon. From what we can learn there was a passenger train following the Southern bound mail train and when near Bacon's station the former ran into the latter killing a child and severely injuring several passengers, besides demolishing several cars. Among the wounded is mail agent Lyles. He is badly cut over the left eye. This is the first accident that has happened on the road in some time.

POSTAL MATTERS.—All mail matter wholly or partly in writing, except book manuscript and corrected proofs passing between authors and publishers, local or drop letters and United States postal cards, is subject to letter postage—three cents for each half ounce or fraction. It is the duty of a postmaster to collect letter postage on any matter of the second or third class arriving at his office containing any writing other than the address. Manuscript for publication in newspapers, magazines or periodicals is subject to letter postage. Letters cannot be carried out of the mail habitually, except in postage stamped envelopes. There is, however, no objection to a person who is not acting as a common carrier carrying a sealed letter, whether in a stamped envelope or not; but to continue the practice, or receive pay therefor, would subject the party to a penalty of \$150.

CHINA AND THE CHINESE.—Our town

was visited this week by the Rev. M. H. Houston and his wife, returned missionaries from China, and our citizens were entertained and instructed by the information conveyed to them, concerning the inhabitants of the colonial country. On Wednesday afternoon the children of the different Sabbath Schools, together with many adults, assembled at the Presbyterian Church, and listened to descriptions of the personal appearance of the Chinese men and women, their superstitions and mummeries of their idol worship, &c., which was illustrated by various articles of personal apparel, articles in common use in their households, and images of the wooden deities, before which they bow in superstitious reverence in the heathen temples. Samples of the shoes worn by the different classes of society, the razors they use to shave their crowns, and the bamboo comb with which they get the tangle out of their "pig-tail," the knife and chop-sticks which they use so dextrously at their meals; the pipes in which they consume tobacco and opium; pictures and images of the Chinese gods; and many specimens of carving, painting, embroidery, needle-work, printing, agricultural implements, writing materials, beads, fans, visiting cards and other matters of interest to old and young.

In the evening, Mr. Houston addressed a large audience in the Presbyterian Church, upon the "condition and wants of China," and furnished many items of interest concerning that interesting country and its inhabitants. We heard many expressions of pleasure from those who were present, and regret that Mr. Houston's stay was so short with us, as many would gladly have heard him again.

Collections were taken up at both meetings, amounting, with the \$25 which the Sabbath School of Seion Church contributed out of their treasury, to over \$70, which will be sent to the committee on Foreign Missions, in Baltimore, to aid in the construction of suitable buildings for the Presbyterian Missionaries residing in Soochow, China.

We are glad Mr. Houston was able to pay our town a visit, and wish our people, particularly the children, could have more frequent opportunities of coming directly in contact with those who have visited foreign lands, and are able and willing to impart the knowledge they have gained to others. Mr. and Mrs. H. left on Friday for Charlotte. They carry with them the good wishes of our people, who would welcome them, should they ever be able to visit us again.
