WHEREAS Electors of President and Vice President of the United Staces are appointed by the General Assembly of South Carolina; and FALL AND WINTER whereas an Act of Congress, passed in 1846, fixed the time when these Electors shall be appointed on a day when the Legislature of this State is not in regular session. In consequence thereof, l, WIL-LIAM H. GIST, in the exercise of the authority conferred by the Constitution to convene the Legislature on extraordinary occasions, do issue this my proclamation, calling upon those Senators of the General Assembly whose terms of office have not expired, and those who have been now recent ly elected, and the members of the House of Representatives who have been now recently resentatives who have been now recently elected, to convene at Columbia on the FIRST MONDAY in NOVEMBER NEXT, that they may be present, on the Tuesday following, to appoint Electors of President and Vice President, in conformity to the Act of Congress above referred to; and also that they may, if advisable, take action for the safety and protection of the State.
