THE CITY MARKET.—On Saturday morning last we walked through this very necessary and useful institution, and were much pleased with its appearance. In the first place, it was as clean as a penny; and in the next, it was so well supplied, that a student of gastronomy could have devoted many hours to delightful study. The meat stalls were well filled with fine parts of beef, mutton, pork, &c., at prices to suit the times and pockets, as we should judge by the number of purchasers we saw surrounding the butchers. The vegetable markets were abundantly supplied with esculents of every kind, and with that taste that has always distinguished our market women, beautifully arranged. Beans, peas, okra, tomatoes, squashes, &c., &c., were very plentiful. The fruit department was more scant than it generally is at this season, owing to great shortness of the crop. There were some melons, however, of huge size—certainly the best we have seen this year. The fish market was not very striking as to variety, but fish was plenty, with a few clab and bass.

We noticed in our stroll a few innovations upon old customs, brought about, no doubt, by the new element that is every day mixing with us and ingrafting upon our industrial habits. Books and papers may be purchased there, and razors, brushes, thumb-nails, scissors, and all the little knick-knacks it is presumed the housewife needs, either for herself or the old man at home. Cold cooked meats and fish can also be obtained, with concomitants, so that he who runs may eat, and we are told, too, at a very small expense. These matters we consider decided benefits on old arrangements, and notice them with great pleasure. We discover more and more, as each new day succeeds the last, that immigration can improve an old city as much as help a new country.

The steamship *Quaker City*, recently purchased by the Leahy Brothers from the Government, has been elegantly fitted up and furnished by them for their Charleston line of packets, for which port she will leave to-day at three P. M., from pier No. 14 East River, foot of Wall-street. The *Quaker City* was a favorite with the traveling public previous to the war, owing to her great speed and easy sea-going qualities; now she possesses additional attractions in her large and airy staterooms and spacious cabins, which must be seen to be appreciated, no expense having been spared in altering her to suit the tastes and requirements of the times. The *Quaker City* is commanded by Captain West, who has retired from the Navy for that purpose.

NORTHEASTERN RAILROAD.—Mr. ALEXANDER CORNELL, who has long been connected with this road as conductor, has recently been appointed to the position of Assistant Superintendent. To the energy of Mr. C. the company as well as the public are greatly indebted for the speedy reconstruction of the trestles and bridges which has enabled the road to resume its work; and we congratulate him upon his promotion, feeling satisfied that the office could not have been conferred upon one who possesses more fully the confidence of the community. We take this occasion to refer our readers to the change of schedule of this road, commencing to-day, and to say that arrangements have been made by which baggage and freight will be conveyed in cars over the Santee River, without breaking bulk. Several cars have already been transported over.

ACCIDENT.—While a car on the Northeastern Railroad, loaded with government stores, was being lowered down the inclined plane on this side of the Santee River, the hawser with which it was connected parted, and with great speed it was precipitated into the stream. It was immediately brought alongside the bank, the roof taken off, and the contents carried ashore. As barrels of hard tack and salt beef were the only passengers it contained, we are happy to say that no lives were lost, though several were badly damaged. The cable, which was in bad condition, has been replaced by one of superior quality.
