THE GAS .- One of the great errors committed by our City Council—and they have many to atone for—was allowing the lighting of the city to go into the hands of a company instead of taking charge of it themselves. They would have been satisfied with less profits than individualsthe jets would have been adjusted to give much more light, and the cost to consumers would have been considerably less. Incorporated bodies usu-ally have an eye more to the profits in an enter-prise than to the comfort of the people, while a government should be more careful of the welfare of its citizens than looking to an overplus of money derived from schemes of improvement. And it is as right that men who make investments of their money in private undertakings should meet with a satisfactory return, as that they who pay taxes, sometimes very heavy, to municipal bodies should be fully compensated with receiving supplies of those necessaries for which they have paid their toll. When the Gas Company first commenced its operations in this city, some fifteen years ago, no place in the Union could boast of being better lighted. But this did not continue very long; in time burners were reduced—the distances between posts were increased-the coal used was of an inferior quality, and our papers teemed with complaints. Remedies were applied, and for a few years before the war a kind of general satisfaction seemed to prevail with the community. During the war no one expected much from them, for the limit to their resources was more visible than their lights, and they did the best their means afforded them.

Our reasons for reviewing the former acts of the Gas Company is, that when civil government is established, and the works are again put fully into their possession, improvements may be madesuch improvements as will satisfy that portion of the public as are moderate in their wants-for instance, desiring to make the street posts more numerous, and consequently closer, and not as now they are, "few and far between." We make no allusion to the present time, for we know that only certain lamps are now lit, but we speak of the spots where the posts were moved to long ago, and still stand.

The lights that now illuminate the city are beautifully clear and bright, so that we have heard but one expression in regard to them-words of praise; and we believe that the same attention which exists at present will continue. The gentleman who presides over the company has had but few opportunities, in consequence of the troubles, to exhibit the energy which we know he possesses, and which he now is showing; but we predict that as soon as the season arrives when the soil can be turned up and the main pipes repaired and other alterations made which are required, complaints, as of old, will cease, and all be bright again.
