LOCAL MATTERS.

TO OUR CITY SUBSCRIBERS.—We would be thankful if there is any failure on the part of our carriers to deliver the DAILY NEWS, if our city subscribers would give us immediate notice. HEALTH OF THE CITY.—The City Registrar (Dr. Geo. S. Pelzer) has sent us for publication the Bill of Mortality for the week ending August 26th. By it we discover that there have been 53 deaths in that time, 36 of which are blacks and colored, and 17 whites—the number of the former being more than double the latter. This is a singular fact, that we have no remembrance of having ever observed before, and it should elicit attention and inquiry.

In examining the statement before us, we find 8 cases of fevers of different kinds—2 whites and 6 blacks; of diarrhoea, 5 cases—all blacks; of old age, 4 cases—all blacks. Of the other diseases none are extraordinary, but only those from which we always suffer at this season, and of which but few have been fatal. Upon the whole, if any doubts exist, out of the city, in regard to the good health of Charleston, an examination of this document in our paper of to-day ought to satisfy all reasonable minds.

THE CHARLESTON GAS WORKS.—The remarks of yesterday in this journal have been understood as conveying a censure on the officers of this company. They were not so intended. During four years of war the gas works have been rapidly wearing out; the great depreciation of the medium in which they were paid, and the impossibility of procuring much of the material wanted for a renewal of the worn-out parts, placed the works in a position of much embarrassment at the time the city was occupied by the Union troops. They were without funds, and stood in need of almost everything. By the energy of a portion of the direction the difficulties have, to a certain degree, been overcome; some coal has been obtained from the North, and several hundred tons lately from England. Through the generosity of an English house the company will be furnished with coal sufficient to carry them to January next on a liberal credit; and measures have been inaugurated which, if carried out, will place the company in a most satisfactory condition.

LOOKING LIKE BUSINESS.—The artisans of our city are particularly busy at this time in repairing and fitting up buildings and stores. Loads of lumber and other stuff are continually passing along to different portions of the town, where they are used by mechanics in refitting damaged establishments and making them suitable for occupation. In Meeting, Hayne and Broad-streets, and on East Bay, four important business avenues, the workmen are actively engaged at their work, endeavoring to fulfill numerous contracts, which must be completed in time to allow tenants to lay in stock for their fall trade. The establishments on King-street were repaired and occupied soon after the evacuation, and for a long time not a place suitable for business in that portion of the city has been obtainable. Meeting-street was next resorted to, and the buildings there renovated and taken possession of as soon as in a tenable state, so that at present there are none in that locality to be rented. We are informed that the three stores nearly opposite Hayne-street, so badly damaged by fire some time ago, will be shortly rebuilt and occupied, making that range complete. In the other streets we have mentioned the scarcity is just as great, and we hear every day of applicants for business stands, who are as yet unsuccessful in their inquiries. Private residences, at a moderate rent, are also in request; the owners of many who would lease not having the means to repair, are compelled to have them remain on their hands in a dilapidated state, useless to all. If an arrangement could be made by which men of means could assist men of property of this class, giving them time, at a legal interest, with a mortgage on the real estate, it would be highly advantageous to the community generally. We are disposed to think that some moneyed men will, in the course of the season, enter into such investments for the benefit of such owners; for while there are many of them who think only of gain, there are certainly others who always connect kindness with profit.

In thus looking around and seeing the present prosperous condition of our city, and believing that in a short time it will be much greater, we feel a thankfulness it is difficult to give expression to—it is in the heart alone, not in the tongue that speaks. We feel the great load of dejection that overpressed us rapidly passing off, as we see each new place of business opened and its occupants actively engaged in trade; and we wish that some of those who are always predicting, with solemn face, that "Charleston is done for," would go around and see what we have so slightly alluded to above, and we guarantee that they would agree with us in saying that the old city is fast recuperating, and before a great length of time will resume the position she once held among the populous places of the Union.
