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INTERESTING FROM NEW ORLEANS.

[Correspondence of the New York Times.]

NEW ORLEANS, August 25.

MIDNIGHT SEARCH OF GEN. BEAUREGARD'S HOUSE.

I have to relate to you a most extraordinary affair which took place in this city on the night of Wednesday last, about 1 P. M., at the residence of General G. T. Beauregard, on Esplanade-street.

About the hour indicated, the family, including the brother of General Beauregard and a number of guests, were wrapped in profound slumber, when an extraordinary noise was heard in the court-yard of the house below. The ladies were first aroused, and were suspicious of some burglary.

The reply was the seizure of the persons of the general and his friends, declaring them under arrest in a small body of United States soldiers, under whose custody the prisoners were placed, separated from one another so as not to be able to communicate.

At the time of the alarm the ladies had come down and were mute spectators of the singular arrest of their relative and host. Observing one of them, the general, who was standing under guard in the corner, spoke to her in French, and advised her to go to her room and complete her toilet.

At the proper hour General Beauregard repaired to the headquarters of Major-General Sheridan, to whose presence he was at once admitted, and by whom he was treated with the greatest consideration and courtesy. General Sheridan assured him that he had not directed, nor was he aware of any intention, to make any such search or to inflict any such punishment upon persons.

General Beauregard, when released on his parole, was guaranteed the privilege of remaining at his home, unmolested, and his private effects were free from search or seizure.

thousand dollars, there would be an universal clamor for it.

Every new thing in the constitution now left us as a legacy by Banks is made odious by the fact that it was imposed upon the people by him; that the convention was composed of foreign adventurers and the droves of our population, and that it was accepted by the votes of soldiers quartered among us, and of men whose transitory stay here was only in search of plunder.

Political organizations are quite chaotic here. The radical faction has become so utterly insignificant in numbers, though well supplied with the possession of such men as Banks, Durant, Hahn, and some others, with managing and even with a higher order of talent, that the great majority finds itself compelled to split up into factions in order to have what every American seems to think the only way to win an election—a party contest.

I wrote to you the other day, enclosing the address of the State Central Executive Committee, signed by our respectable old fellow-citizen, Judge Davigneaud. Like most others, I supposed that this organization was a whim of all the elements opposed to radicalism, and, probably, it was so intended, but its call for war and party organization was met by the lingering remains of the late most detestable convention and legislature, who met together and voted themselves delegates.

It was thereby found that the tax-paying and non-paying voters, the really conservative men, must seek some other association, or they would fall in nomination for their votes the very creatures who were barely recovering from their debauch over the life-blood of Louisiana. While men were debating what they should do, out comes the following notice:

DEMOCRATIC STATE CONVENTION.

The undersigned, for two years past, members of the Democratic and Conservative State Executive Committee, duly constituted, after full consultation with the Democratic and Conservative citizens of New Orleans and the State at large, would respectfully recommend a thorough and prompt organization under the broad banner of the National Democratic party, as offering the best promise for the preservation of our rights and liberties.

To effect this we recommend that a Democratic State Convention be held at the Mechanics Institute, on Dryades-street, near Canal-street, in New Orleans, on Monday, 2d October, 1865, at 12 M.

The representations amongst the several parishes shall be on the basis of the total number of votes cast in each parish at the Presidential election held in 1860.

FROM RED RIVER.  
There was a very foolish story about at Clarksville, Red River county, Texas, on the 5th, that that there had been an engagement near Brownsville between the Imperialists and General Steele, and that the latter lost seven thousand men. It was brought there from Tyler, Texas, and declared to be official. It was fishy, nevertheless, for we have news from the Rio Grande four days later than the rumor, and then all was peace, and likely so to continue.

Zyler, in Smith county, Texas, is an ambitious little "city." It has as yet not had troops quartered upon its inhabitants, and it consequently puts forth, through its Reporter, the following boast of itself:

A Good Community.—Not an exchange regards us, it says, from any of our sister towns and cities where troops are stationed, without accounts of thefts, robberies, and even murders. We are without any of any description in our city, and have been for two months; notwithstanding, we have not a single act of lawlessness to chronicle. Altogether, we believe we may claim one of the best communities in the State.

THE UNITED STATES AND THE MONROE DOCTRINE.  
A POPULAR ENGLISH VIEW OF THE RECENT "WAR"—SPEECH OF GENERAL SHERIDAN.

The incoherence of speech in which American public men freely indulge is very apt to mislead European opinion. We are startled to read that a leading minister has accused a power in alliance with his government, or that a renowned general has expressed his eagerness for war.

Wern M. de Lavallette to declare that Austria should be expelled from Venice, or, were it not, Grey to denounce the French occupation of Mexico, should foresee that war was a question not of weeks, but of days. The leading officials of the United States, however, assume the rights without the reticence of office, and all do not feel that sense of mutual responsibility which binds the English Cabinet together.

In the United States there is no Cabinet properly so called. The President is the real ruler, with so many head clerks to execute his orders. He may consult them separately or in assembly, but none of the secretaries holds himself answerable for what is done beyond his own department. We saw this abundantly exemplified during the late war; on the negro question, on the mode of winking at the embargo, on the personal merits of the leading generals, the ministers freely differed and freely expressed their dissenting sentiments; until the divergence attained its largest limits, when the Secretary of the Navy formally defended that seizure of the Trent, which, a few weeks afterwards, was formally repudiated by the Secretary of State.

Alma, a Russian nobleman, who, after having studied the telegraphic business in the United States for several years, has taken part in the undertaking. We may be pretty sure that this enterprise will be a success in every point of view. Whether it will ever be superseded in part or whole by an Atlantic cable, is a question which may yet take many years and repeated experiments to answer.

We understand that at the approaching General Conference, the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, removing all sectional features from its discipline, declaring its loyalty to the Government, will take the field in every State of the Union as a distinct organization, frowning upon every effort to make its ministers the pimps of a party, resolved to be true to its Bridlewood, and guilty of no adulterous intimacy with Mammon.
