## LOCAL MATTERS.

IT is with deep sorrow that we announce the death of Major WILLIAM LAVAL, which took place some days ago ago, at the town of Greenville, in this State. He had for years filled many offices of trust amongst us with great fidelity, and no one was regarded higher than he as an honorable citi-He endeavored to fulfill his duties as a Christian in this world, and he has gone, we hope, to meet his reward in another.

THE COLUMBIA Phaniz makes montion that Mr. JOSEPH DANIEL POPE, long known as a prominent planter on the scaboard of South-Carolina, has made, under the auspices of Major-General Q. A. GILLMORE, a tour through some of the Parishes of lower Carolina, which have been worked by the freedmen. The report is said to be moderate in tone, entirely free from prejudice, unique in its consideration of the topics embraced, and singularly fair and indulgent towards the negro. Mr. POPE is familiar with the estates, with every peculiarity in their culture; knowing well the susceptibilities of the land, and perfectly acquainted with their capacity for production, no person could be found better fitted for an examination of their present condition.

TORNADO OF 1811 .- Yesterday, September 10, was the anniversary of this over-memorable tornado; and if we had the means of referring to the publications of that period we could certainly make up an interesting article, describing in detail the ravages it committed in an exceedingly short space of time. Its track was from S. E. to N. W., beginning at the Battery, and in the twinkling of an eye crossing the city diagonally, "mak-ing playthings" of everything that stood in its course. It struck the splendid mansion, then the property of Mr. Russell, in Meeting-street, next to the Scotch Church, and injured it badly-the mark of an extensive fissure, though well repaired, being still visible. A portion of a window-shutter from this building was found in the garden of the late JOHN HUME, at the corner of Wentworth and Smith streets. The shed of the house at the southeast corner of Magazine and Mazyek streets was lodged in the jail-yard, and several other houses were unroofed and upset. A number of persons were killed, and a negro girl who was in an upper chamber where a house had the roof taken off, was thrown over the walls of the room and found dead in an adjoining lot. Some of our old inhabitants, no doubt, remember distinctly the many accidents which occurred on this melancholy occasion.

Assault .- We are informed that on Saturday night last Mr. MCNAMNON, the accommodating proprietor of the Bathing House, was assaulted by some individual and very badly beaten over the head with a bottle; but we are happy to say he was yesterday improving, and apparently not so seriously injured as was as first supposed.

------Ronnear.-The residence of J. H. Gadsden, a colored man, No. 25 Spring-street, was entered on Saturday morning last, at about one o'clock, and from his pockets were taken forty-five dollars and papers of value, and also the key of his barber-shop, under the Merchants' Hotel. The thief obtained access to his bed-room by climbing the piazza posts to the second story-a new plan adopted by burglars, it seems, but very fashionable at present, and very successful.
