LOCAL MATTERS.

IN ADDITION TO OUR former election returns, we have the following: Newberry.—E. P. Lake, R. S. Stewart, Henry Sumner. Lexington.—Messrs. Boozer and Fox.

WE ARE requested to state that the Mail Steamship Granada arrived off the bar on Sunday, at 3 o'clock P. M., and that she was prevented from coming in earlier than she did because of her heavy freight.

PARDON TO GOVERNOR AIKEN.—We are pleased to mention that our fellow-citizen, the Hon. WM. AIKEN, yesterday received by mail, from His Excellency ANDREW JOHNSON, a full and complete pardon.

MUSTERED OUT.—We are informed that the 33d South Carolina and 102d Michigan U. S. C. T. are on their way from up the country to their places of rendezvous, to be mustered out of service.

THE RICE CROP NEAR GEORGETOWN, S. C.—A letter from Georgetown, S. C., dated September 2, gives a favorable notice of some of the rice crops in that neighborhood, and affords us the hope that at least in the localities mentioned something more than provisions will be made.

Below we give the extracts from the letter above mentioned; and as it puts the freedmen in a more favorable light than many others have, it affords us much satisfaction to assist its publicity:

GEORGETOWN, S. C., Sept. 2, 1865. Agreeably to your request I have inspected Mrs. Lard's place, and find them in a much better condition, and the negroes more orderly and well-behaved, than I anticipated. They seemed glad to see some one who was authorized by their mistress to visit them. At the Mt. Pleasant plantation there are 125 acres of rice planted, and 20 acres of corn, good for two-thirds of a crop.

At Weymouth 94 acres of rice and 38 acres of corn, and on Island tract 63 acres of rice. At Hickory Hill about 150 acres in rice and 20 acres in corn, on all of which I think two-thirds of a crop will be made. The drivers say that they are very much in need of shot and powder; if you can send up a bag of rice bird shot and a keg of powder, please do so, as it is indispensably necessary to keep the birds off the rice. These creatures, you know, are very destructive. I have seen entire fields totally destroyed by them.

THE SOUTH CAROLINA RAILROAD.—Mr. MAGRATH, the President of this Road, has returned, and reports having been completely successful in procuring iron and other materials for the construction of this road. By the first of October the communication between Charleston and Columbia will, in all probability, be re-established, and the iron is now on its way for the benefit of the Hamburg road. The entire work is now progressing, and as soon as the breaks are overcome which now interrupt the several lines, a rapid completion, without any kind of delay, may be expected.

CRIME.—When we glance over the papers of some of our sister Southern cities, we are appalled at the lists of midnight robberies, assaults, highway thefts, &c., that meet our eye, and we wonder if crime stalks in our streets, as we see it does in other places, without an effort to stop it. We find that the efforts made here are as effectual as can be under the circumstances, and our city is as clear of burglaries, or highway robberies at night, or riots, or brawls, as any in the Union. That a great deal, if not all, of this is due to the efficiency of the present police under the supervision of Captain E. G. HOFFMAN, cannot be denied; and as an evidence of what we have said, we refer to the annexed table, which exhibits but few offenses in the large population that we now have in the city. The following number of arrests for the annexed crimes have been made by the city police for the week ending September 10, 1865:
