OUR RHADERS will have mot with many expressions of virtuous indignation, at the North, at the cruelly reckless course pursued by President JOHNSON in the restoration of the Union. Ordinary proprieties have not been preserved; the men of the South have not been required to exhibit anything like the proper demonstrations of humiliation and abasement. But, werse than all, neglecting propriety in this matter, he has neglected, also, common sense; he has inflicted no slaughter; he has taken but little plunder-in a civil way; and, altogether, is neglecting opportunities in such wise as to bring his mind or morals seriously in question. Of the feeling inspired by these facts, the utterances ring throughout the North, until we, ourselves, can scarce forbear a tear of sympathy for their ruined hopes. Of these, we take the following from the Chicago

We feel reluctant to believe that the treasures— Peace, Union, Liberty—which we have drawn up as it were out of an ocean of blood and tears, are about to be east back into the sea by the hands to which they are entrusted; but we are compelled to say to the Union party of the North, "your salvation depends upon yourselves."

This is sad. With zeal and patient and painful

industry, they had fished up treasures, and these treasures were of "peace, union and liberty;" and they had fished them up from an "ocean of blood and tears," and yet they are not permitted to en-joy them—the cup is dashed from their parched lips by the very hand appointed to hold it. Can anything be sadder? All gone; and they, the miserable victims of misplaced confidence, have not even the satisfaction of feeling that it was from the fiat of superior and invincible power. That peace which consisted in the perfect devastation of a prostrate section—that Union which consisted in the concentration in their hands of all the power of a common country-that liberty which consisted in the power to inflict unmeasured oppressions upon another portion of a common people-all gone-snatched from their grasp in the very instant of fruition-presents a picture of disappointment and of cruel and unmitigated wrongs of which it is their privilege and obligation to complain, and to call upon the pure and virtuous of all ages and countries to be the witness of their injuries, and, by indignant repudiation of its author, to avenge them.

THE RESULT of the recent elections in Connecti cut is, perhaps, one of the most cheering indications that has yot occurred of the course of political action at the North. That course has been looked to by people here with feelings of exceeding interest. It was important, of course, that we should re-enter the Union in the possession of political rights, and of these the most important was the right to regulate our own domestic relations. This right the Executive and the better people of the North were willing to accord. They were desirous of a great uniform and compact republic, and saw no advantage in the elevation of one sec tion of that republic upon the ruin of the other. That to them seemed, in fact, but another form of that very dissolution against which the energies of the republic had already been directed; and not only did they not concur in it, but were ready to use every agency within reach to prevent it, but a large portion of the people of the section expecting to be so elevated very vehemently desired it. It was the condition, not only of the patronage and spoils presented by the Southern States, but of the continuance of their own power and preservation, perhaps, from some of the evils of depression which they proposed to inflict upon the section apparently already in subjection. To this end, therefore, their prominent leaders took ground, their organs raised up their banners, the patriotic hearts of their people were fired at the thought of further cheap victories, and there were unequivocal declarations of the purpose, in pursuit of this laudable object, to measure arms with the Government itself.

The battle-ground proposed for this decisive struggle was in Congress. There they possessed the majority in the absence of delegations from the South, and with that majority they proposed to bar the doors of that assembly. No State was to be admitted without a delegation elected in conformity with their determinations as to what was proper; and to make it certain that no State could come with a delegation so properly elected, they had taken the ground that in such elections the negroes should be allowed to vote. This would be the practical abandonment of every essential principle of liberty. No State could be considered in possession of her government which should be obliged to elect its delegates in accordance with the dictates of any other States; and no people could be in possession of any rights and liberties with liability to be governed by its colored race. But they made that issue with shouts and trumpets-the "banner with that strange device" was given to the Northern breeze, and has been floating for a month or more. Whether the issue be practicable or not, was to be determined by the popular elections. If the people of the North were ready to sustain their members in Congress, they could go on safely and take their stands before the doors of Congress. And the first State to decide upon the question was the State of Connecticut, from which much was expected. The discourtesy was exhibited of conceding to that State a very slight regard for the rights of others; and it was considered scarcely possible that she should disappoint their very humble estimate of her mo rality and virtue. She possesses a very small no gro population, and to make the matter more easy, the issue was made in the form of a vote as to her own willingness to extend to negroes the elective franchise.

But of all those reasonable expectations there was a complete disappointment. Not even to in-flict that injury upon others will they inflict it on themselves; and it is to be assumed therefore that this State has taken her final stand upon that subject, and it is final in the issue. It is utterly impossible they can make their stand against the Government, if one of their own strongholds shall be turned against them; and it is to be expected, therefore, that the party will withdraw and dis band its forces for a time at least, preparatory to a state of peace. It is hardly possible that they can be permanently well-behaved - they must adopt some other course to political success, but that course will not be apt to be in further antag- it will be forwarded by mail, free of postage, to any part onism to the South on account of slavery. That, to all reasonable apprehension, is done with, and the South once again in the Union without slaves, will be apt to be less assailed than any other sec tion. The next contest will, doubtless, be between the Northesstern and Northwestern States, and the South will act as mediator, and possibly peacemaker, between them.
