RETURN OF THE FOREIGN CAPITALISTS.—Sir Morton Peto and party have returned to this city after their rapid but extended tour through the West. In every prominent place on their route they were entertained by the public authorities, Boards of Trade, and prominent citizens. No party of tourists has ever before visited our country with more praiseworth; methes, nor has any other similar party been more cardially welcomed. The result of their observations, we are glad to hear, is favorable to a still more liberal employment of foreign capital in our public improvements than that hitherto bestowed.

Among the gratifying results of their visit will

Among the gratifying results of their visit will be the laying of a double track on the Eric Railroad from this city to the junction with the Atlantic and Great Western Road at Salamanca; the shortening of the distance on the Eric Road about seventy miles; the building of the railroad bridge across the Niagara, near Buffale—a structure that will cost some five millions of dollars—and the extension of the branches of the Atlantic and Great Western Road from all the principal points where the main track is laid. These enterprises will involve the expenditure of perhaps a hundred millions of dollars, without taking into consideration the real design of these European capitalists, viz: the shortening of the route to the East Indies by a grand railway across the American continent. The object of these foreign gentlemen in visiting our country and examining our system of internal improvements has not been more happily realized in witnessing our physical resources than in observing the union, harmony, prosperity and progressiveness our people have everywhere displayed in the course of their route.—N. Y. Herald.

#### CHARLESTON MARKET.

TUESDAY EVENING, October 10. COTTON-The news received by the China, of an advance of from eight to ten cents per pound, has unsettled our market. A few buyers, under the excitement, bought at 45 @ 48 cents for middlings; but the brokers generally held off, not submitting to the high prices demanded by factors; therefore the sales are small and ir. regular at advanced rates.

The gold market has been active and excited. It opened strong at 1474 and rose rapidly to 149, when the Sub-Treasury began selling some of its surplus. The fide instantly turned under a general rush to sell, and the price fell from the highest price touched to 146½ within an hour. It subsequently reacted to 147½, but relapsed to 146½, at which it closed. The sudden rise was in part attributable to speculation based upon the heavy demand for enstones duties, and the prespect of legitimate causes carrying the premium higher.

Foreign exchange was duil at 109½@½ for bankers' sterling at sixty days. The leading drawers ask ½ more. The exports of breadstuffs and cotton are likely to become lighter. In the former there is no inducement to duip anything but Indian corn and oats. The stock of winter wheat having fallen about forty millions of bushels below the average crop it is very scarce, and rose about 12e. B bushel to-day. There is even talk on the Corn Exchange of importing from Liverpool some of the latter which was exported from this side; but this is hardly likely. The further rise to-day in all kinds of breadstuffs, provisions and cotton tends to discourage exports, and indirectly to advance the gold premium, the latter being both a cause and a consequence.
