LOCAL MATTERS.

WE ARE pleased to learn that the South Carolina Railroad trains will go through as far as Hopkins Turn-out on this day, and that stages for the accommodation of twenty passengers will be at the terminus of the road, to convey them to Columbia. The charge will be three dollars.

BISHOP ELLIOTT.—The Savannah Republican of Monday states that "Bishop STEPHEN ELLIOTT, the eloquent and gifted Bishop of the Diocese of Georgia, arrived in our city on Saturday, from Augusta. We understand the Bishop delivered a sermon yesterday at Christ Church."

FOREIGN IMPORTATIONS.—There was cleared at Liverpool for this port, from the 14th to 19th September, 1865, the following articles: 66 cases brandy, 100 tons coal, 1 case gun cases, 2 packages hardware, 1 ton iron castings, 1 cask composition nails, 480 tons salt, 83,700 slates, 300 boxes tin plates, 935 tiles, and 3 cases wire cloth.

BILL OF MORTALITY.—The deaths for the past week have been a little greater than previously reported, the whole number being 48—14 whites and 34 blacks and colored. Although the weather has been tolerably cool, the number of cases of fever are the same as the previous report, viz: 8—of 2 white and 6 colored. Of disease of brain, there were 4—2 white adults and 2 colored children. Of convulsions, 4—1 white child and 3 colored. Of dropsy, 4—1 white adult and 1 colored adult and 2 children. Of old age, 5 colored. Of other diseases the numbers are small, and the cases the same as are generally found at this season in our Bills of Mortality.

WE ARE gratified to be able to state that our esteemed fellow-townsmen, Mr. CHARLES, of the popular business house of CHARLES & CO., arrived in the city by the Quaker City, from New York, where he has been for some months. We welcome back Mr. CHARLES with all our heart, and trust that he may find our climate more pleasant for the few months to come than when he left. The business establishment of the firm has been removed to East Bay, where they have a greater and much more varied stock of groceries than formerly—though always among the largest of our dealers. We understand that Mr. CHARLES, during his trip North, made very strenuous exertions among capitalists to raise stock sufficient to build a railway branch from the Charleston and Savannah Railroad to Hilton Head, and that every evidence warrants the belief that at a very early day the work to the accomplishment of the desirable end will be commenced. It is thought, with a great deal of good reason, that if such a road was in existence, the harbor at Port Royal could successfully invite ships of the greatest draft to enter that haven, where they would find a spacious harbor, with room enough to accommodate the shipping of a great commercial mart. Ships of the heaviest draft could come in here loaded for Charleston or Savannah, and with this connecting railway link their freights could be immediately transported to their destination. We hope Mr. CHARLES'S project will soon be a fact accomplished.

THE SUBSCRIBER'S notice from the Assistant Postmaster, General may be of considerable interest to many of our readers:

The Postoffice Department hereby gives notice that the penalties fixed by law for carrying letters outside the mails, when not enclosed in Government stamped envelopes, will be rigidly enforced in every instance where violations are known to exist.

Only letters relating solely to the cargo or articles conveyed as freight by such steamboat, sailing vessel, railroad, express company, stage, or omnibus line, traveling over a mail route, may be lawfully carried not so enclosed. Unpaid letters for delivery, and those prepaid by postage stamps, cannot be carried outside the mail by any such letter, except by the express company, stage, or omnibus line, or other conveyance without subjecting the captain, driver, or other employe to a penalty of \$100 for each and every such offence.—Sections 9, 10, 11 and 12, Act of March 3, 1845.

Postmasters and other Agents of this Department will see that the law is obeyed.

THE DEATH OF THE "MAJOR."—In this column, today, it will be seen that an inquest has been held over a negro named David Chapman, who, although he was well known by almost all of our citizens, will not be recognized by that name. David was a good-faced, bow-legged dwarf, who in former years was always to be seen in Broad-street, near the old Post-office, but lately resided in the neighborhood of the Charleston Hotel—but since the evacuation of the city, having donned a United States uniform, which was made to fit him very well, he assumed the title of "Major." His figure was peculiar—in fact, ludicrous—but his temper was so good, that he never was put out at being laughed at, but would join merrily at any joke made at his expense. His countenance was remarkably good, and his head bore more evidences of intellect than will be found in many of his class. He was so great a favorite with the gentlemen of the city that he had very little association with his own color, and we were afraid, when we read the verdict of the jury of inquest, that a mistaken kindness on the part of his friends had produced his early death. We, who have known him from childhood, and have looked upon him as one of the best of his color, know him to have been a good tempered, honest, and affectionate in the highest degree, and, being aware that he possessed these good qualities, we truly regret his death. His age was about twenty-two.
