INTERVIEW OF THE SOUTH CAROLINA DELEGATION WITH THE PRESIDENT.

WASHINGTON, October 18.—Judge Wardlaw, Alfred Hugier and Col. Edw. Hawkins, of South Carolina, this afternoon had an interview by appointment with President Johnson. They were accompanied by W. H. Trescott, who is here on business as executive agent of that State.

Judge Wardlaw remarked that they were well aware of that. The President, resuming, said there may be some unkind feeling on this subject, but it did not exist to any great extent.

Judge Wardlaw remarked that the tone of the newspapers was more favorable, and different from what it was. He then asked if the President had seen a copy of the Amended Constitution of South Carolina.

A conversation of some length ensued between the President and Judge Wardlaw and Mr. Trescott as to the legislation of the State necessary in reference to the condition of the freedmen and to the scope and consequences of the Circular No. 10.

The President said we must be practical, and come up to surrounding circumstances. Judge Wardlaw, Colonel Hawkins, and Mr. Hugier expressed to the President the conviction that the State had accepted in good faith the result of the issue which had been made.
