It is now understood that General Hampton has publicly declined being a candidate for Governor. This is only in confirmation of what he had said before; and it was expected, from his open and manly character, that he would do so in an authoritative shape.

It may be proper now to state, what is well known by Colonel Onn's friends, that he acknowledges General Hampton's hold upon the favor of our people, and that he would not have allowed himself to be put in nomination except upon the understanding that the General would not consent

It may be added, too, upon undoubted authority, that Colonel Onn's dispositions towards the lowcountry are most kindly and generous. To use his own words, "His impulses are as warm and generous for the seaboard as for the mountains."

Colonel One will now be the only candidate in the field. It is to be hoped that our people, in this first popular election for Governor, will give a hearty and general vote for the candidate from the upper country, and so inaugurate a cordial and thorough union between the two sections of the State. To promote and strengthen this union is the office of true statesmanship.

Editors Charleston Daily News: I was in Columbia last Friday, and heard casually from some of Gen. Hampton's friends that he had declined being nominated for Governor. The same thing was also generally understood during [the sitting of the Convention. Learning on my arrival here that he would probably receive a large number of votes, and believing, as one of his friends, that it would be more agreeable to him not to be voted for under the circumstances, I lost no time in sending him a telegraphic dispatch to this effect: "A great many persons here mean to vote for you as Governor. confined by Assistant Commissioners within the limits

of their jurisdiction. 2d. Free transportation on Government transports and U. S. Military railroads will be furnished to such teachers only of Refugees and Freedmen, and persons laboring voluntarily in behalf of Refugees and Freed men, as may be duly accredited by the Commissioner or Assistant Commissioners of the Bureau.

All stores and school books necessary to the subsisence, comfort, and instruction of dependent Refugees and Freedmen, may be transported at Government ex pense, when such stores and books shall be turned over to the officers of the Quartermaster's Department with the approval of the Assistant Commissioners, Commissioner or Department Commander, the same to be transported as public stores, consigned to the Quarter-master of the Post to which they are destined, who, after inspection, will turn them over to the Assistant Commissioners or Bureau Agent for whom they are in

tended for distribution. All army officers traveling on public duty, under the orders of the Commissioner or Assistant Commissioners, within the limits of their respective jurisdictions, will be entitled to mileage, or actual cost of transportation according to the Revised Army Regulations, when transportation has not been furnished them by the Quarter master's Department.

No person qualified to vote shall be permitted to vote
in more than one Election District, and the Managers
will administer to every person or persons so offering to
vote the following oath: "I do solemnly swear or afirm
(as the case may be) that I have not, at this Election for
Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, Senators and Representatives, voted in this or any other District, and that I am
duly qualified to vote—so help me, God."

The Constitution provides that 'every voter shall be a
free white man who has attained the age of twenty-one
years, and is not a pauper, nor a non-commissioned officer or private soldler of the army, nor a seaman or a
order of the navy of the United States; he shall, for
two years next preceding the day of election, have been
a citizen of the State: or for the same period an emigrant from Europe, who has declared his intention to
become a citizen of the United States, according to the
Constitution and laws of the United States. He shall
have resided in the State for at least two years next preceding the day of election, and for the last six months of
the time in the District in which he offers to vote. If
any person has his home in this State, he does not lose
the right of residence by temporary absence, with the
intention of returning; and if he has his home in the any person has his home in this State, he does not lose the right of residence by temporary absence, with the intention of returning; and if he has his home in the Election District, his right to vote is not impaired by temporary absence, with the intention of returning; but if one has his home and his family in another State, the presence of such person, although continued for two years in the State, gives him no right to vote.
