The rapid revival of trade with the South stimulates the manufacturing districts of Eugland to renewed activity. The London Daily News, of the

"The accounts from our manufacturing districts show that the expected revival of the trade with the United States has begun there in earnest. At Manchester an enormous business is being done, both for yarns and cloth. Goods are wanted at once, proposals for the execution of orders in a few weeks being received with extreme impatience by shippers, who prefer to buy available goods at a considerable advance rather than lose the opportunities of an excited market."

"Nor is it only a revival of old relations that is now taking place; for the first time within these thirty years the South, no longer having a "peculiar institution" to screen and defend, dares to treat the North as one country with itself, and invite its citizens to come with the energy and capital which are so much needed there. All the more enterprising of the Southern States are calling for the advent of Northern men. The civil authorities and the journalists of Virginia, North and South Carolina, Georgia, Alabama, Tennessee, Kentucky and Missouri carnestly invite immigration to their respective States, setting forth at length the extraordinary inducements which the "new order of things" in those regions presents to industrious and thrifty people. By many of the vestels leaving New York for points on the Southern scaboard, as also by inland modes of conveyance, enterprising artisans, mechanics and laborers leave the North in considerable numbers, in quest of the employment and fortune which are so enthusiastically promised them. There is nothing since Lee's surrender which more strikingly demonstrates the magnitude of the revolution which has passed over the public than this flow of immigration into States which very lately were practically closed to the free emigrant."

The Presbyterians are likely to have a further "split" on the subject of slavery. Now, in the Presbyterian Synod at present in session, a series of resolutions condemning that action have been under discussion for several days past. The telegraphic dispatch we published on Saturday stated that they have been voted down by a vote of 102 to 25. That is to say, the Synod (State) stands by the action of the (Lonisville) Presbytery. This vote will probably be followed now by the open secssion of the majority of Kentucky Presbyterians from the General Assembly of the United States.—a secssion which would be impossible if the General Assembly have the politics, and especially political abolitionism, alone.
