News Summary.

A letter from Hilton Head, dated October 29, to the Savannah Herald, mentions that the schooner Willie Dill, from New York, at Port Royal, picked up, off Charleston, on Friday last, a boat belonging to the steamship Republic, containing twenty-three of the passengers and crew of that vessel.

Every day brings farther information of the great disasters at sea, arising from the effects of the late severe gale, which extended its ravages all along the coast.

The N. Y. Herald says: "We would call the attention of the Board to the importance of replacing at once the Lightship on Frying Pan Shoals; also the light on Tybee Island, mouth of Savannah River.

The Washington correspondent of the Philadelphia Ledger says: "What President Johnson will do, I hear, is to throw the 'Empire,' Louis Napoleon and the Monroe Doctrine upon Congress, and leave it for that body to say whether MAX. shall be politely told to quit, or whether we shall do as all Europe has done, recognize him as the constituted authority in that country."

THE ELECTION of Governor PERRY to the Senate of the United States will, we are assured, be received with cordial approbation.

With these requisitions Governor PERRY, in a very eminent degree, complies. That he is agreeable to the Government is evident from his appointment to the office he at present holds; and though in sympathy with the people of our State in the sufferings and sacrifices of their recent contest, he was too little identified with the movement to present in his record a point of opposition to the dominant power in Congress, which would not, if affording sufficient ground for his exclusion, afford ground for the exclusion, also, of any possible delegation from the Southern States.

THE QUESTION of negro testimony has been considered much of late, and must soon come prominently before the people of this State in the Colored Code submitted to the Legislature.

But, if not necessary to the complete restoration of civil law, it has the still higher merit of being right. There has been little occasion, hitherto, for negro testimony. They have had few points of contact with an external world. They traded little—had few opportunities of collision with any other authority than that in control of the place on which they lived.

But this is changed. From being the best protected human creature in the world, he is now the worst. He must now not only enter into all the contracts necessary to his own subsistence and preservation, but into all the contacts and collisions to which these contracts lead him.

the ordinary and obvious means of meeting the trial such responsibility imposes.

By these considerations, we are impelled to the conviction that it is not only expedient, but right, that the negro should have the privilege of appearance in our courts.

Nor is it necessary that testimony should be taken in any case in which the rights of colored persons are not involved. The occasion for such testimony indicates the limit to its introduction.
