War News Dealers supplied at a liberal discount News Summary.

The steamship Quaker City, Captain West, which left New York at 4 P. M. on Saturday last, arrived at her wharf yesterday about 1 P. M. Her passenger and freight list will be found under their proper heads. Purser JAMES P. McElinov has put us under obligations for New York papers of Saturday.

Gen. JOSEPH E. JOHNSTON is at present in New York city, where he has had many visitors. He is in excellent health, and the New York papers say that he represents the submission of the people of the South as unreserved and in good faith.

Governor BROWNLOW, of Tennessee, in a late letter, ways the entire State of Tennessee abounds with thieves and robbers, who would murder a man for his watch or a five dollar bill. He has no faith in the Southern professions of loyalty, thinks the war ended at least two years too soon for the good of the country, and solures the Republican majority not to admit to Congress indiscriminately the representatives from the lately rebellious States. Those States, he maintains, will not elect loyal men to Congress, nor can loyal men be elected Governors of them. He believes that the political leaders there have not abandoned their lilea of a separate confederacy, and that they are now reorganizing to make another effort at rebellion.

It is reported that JOHN OVERTON, well known in Ten nessee as one of the most opulent of the rich men of the State, has had his pardon revoked by order of the President, who is said to have telegraphed Gov. Browsnow to that effect. What has prevented Mr. Overston's con-trition for his rebellious sins from being complete and satisfactory to the Government, does not definitely ap-

Telegrams have been received by the President, Gen. Fish and the Freedmen's Dureau, signed by seven or eight of the leading influential men of Tennessee, which remonstrate against the anticipated removal of a supervising officer of the above Bureau, now on duty in that State, and the appointment of a civilian of the State in-The telegrams in question admit the entire equity of the freedmen's system as at present administered in Tennessee, and desire that no change be made, Another communication has been received by the Bureau from a prominent citizen of the South, which warmly expresses the belief that the labor system of the South, as now regulated and directed, has been the only safeguard from complete worthlessness of negro labor by reason of the sud en relaxation of discipline and withdrawal of absolute authority to coerce industry among the blacks.

THE QUESTION of the rollief of our citizens, to some extent, from their condition of pecuniary embarrassment, has already been considered in our columns, and the public mind seems composed upon the proposition to provide, if possible, for the expenses of the current year without resort to taxes. But there is a feeling that even this is not enough; that while it will give relief to many persons who are so reduced they could not raise the funds for taxes, and provide the necessaries of subsistence, it does not supply the desideratum; that the paramount want now is of capital, and of capital particularly in agricultural pursuits; that planters have not the funds with which to carry on their operations now, since wages must be paid, and paid regularly, and in advance of products; that they must, of necessity, therefore, contract operations, or suspend operations, or dispose of their tating the cultivation of the land, and of protecting proprietors in the remnant of estates, there is a desire to still further extend the policy, and, if it be possible, to raise a fund upon the credit of the State, with which to extend to business interests the facilities they so much require.
