## News Summary.

The Memphis Bulletin of 26th. a s: "Last night, for the first time in ten years, teleg ... phic communication was held between New York and New Orleans direct. The first message transmitted from New York to New Orleans was: 'Weather clear and pleasant-8.55;' when the answer returned was: 'Weather clear and cooltime, 7.50.' Another dispatch from New York was fol lowed by thirty-one messages from New Orleans to New York, occupying about forty minutes. Each message ed twenty words. This length of line has been worked only once before, and that was between San Francisco and New York, a few months, the only success attending which was the transmission of a fev words. This leaves the credit to the stretch of line be tween New Orleans and New York of being the largest over which any business has ever been done in this

The New York Post's Washington correspondent says Prominent Republicans who have had interviews with the President within a few days assert confidently that he agrees with the average sentiment of Congress upon the subject of reconstruction. At a Cabinet meeting held on Friday last, the President expressed himself in strong terms of disapprobation of the South, because of its apparent refusal to accept the terms of reconstruc-tion held out. The defeat of all Union candidates, and the nomination of the worst rebels to office, he regards as indicating anything but a loyal spirit, and while the late rebellious South remains in this dangerous mood

The New York Journal of Commerce thinks that. though all classes of dry goods show a decline, 'that is does not follow from any known facts that staple goods may not be as high in the spring as they have been this fall. Producers will crowd their looms, and a dull opening may create a panic in prices; but the causes which have stimulated and sustained the speculations of the last two years, are by no means removed, or in process of removal." On the same subject, the Financial Chronicle says : "Goods of all kinds are rapidly accumulating, very much against the wishes of holders. The bottom is not yet reached, but a further reduction of ave or seven per conf. will bring about reduction will

soon clear the market of the present accumulation. Prices are not yet down to those of the last week in August, at which time trade commenced so briskly. The long period of duliness which has followed the unwarranted advance of September and October, will suggest more cautiousness should trade again spring up. The Cincinnati Price Current, of the 22d instant, says

that during the present season, so far, 61,923 hogs have been received there, against 56,344 for the corresponding time last year, and adds that the market is dull. further remarks; "There has been a fair jobbing de mand for the product, and packers were disposed to do enough to meet it, and prices of hogs were consequently fully sustained. The sales were made at \$10.50@\$11.50 gross, the latter, however, an extreme zate for large, suitable for butcher's use, and at \$13.50@\$14 net. It is very clear that a most important change must take place in the sentiment of packers of pork, or they will not operate to any extent at the present rates. They are not to take the responsibility of holding a stock of pork at these prices during the next three months, and hence it is that there is nothing doing for the future worth naming."

At the Virginia Methodist Conference, now in session at Danville, Va., we notice the names of several prominent clergymen present, among the rest the Revs. D. S. DOGGETT, JAMES A. DUNCAN, JOHN E. EDWARDS, LEROY M. LEE, NELSON HEAD and LEONIDAS ROSSER. Remarks made by Bishop EarLy during the session, led to the conclusion that he is opposed to continuing preachers on their old circuits and stations for another year. A preamble and resolutions were offered in view of the approaching General Conference next April, opposed to radical changes in the government of the Methodist Episcopal Church South, questioning the wisdom of the policy of a bishop for every State Conference; recommending alteration in the law so as to permit preachers to serve the same pastoral charge for three consecutive years, and epposed to lay representation in the councils of the church. The paper was referred to a committee.

A collision occurred on the 24th between the steamers Niagara and Post Boy, on the Mississippi River, seven miles above Helena. The Niagara sunk in twenty feet water, and one hundred deck passengers, mostly discharged colored soldiers, were drowned. The cabin pas sengers were all saved. The Niagara was valued at \$130,000. She was not insured. There were two hunared tons of freight on board. The Post Boy wes unin-

The Secretary of War has completed the estimates ne cessary for his report, and will immediately prepare it for publication. The estimates for maintaining the army for the ensuing year at its present force on a peace foot ing is therty-three millions of dollars. Enough material of war is left to arm and equip a million of men, or to maintain our present force in the field for a year, on a war footing.

Immense quantities of army cloth and blankets are in process of being permanently stored in the various arschale, while in one depot alone there is stored ten thousand tons of nitre, and the quantity is increasing Enough has been realized from the sales of material thus for to maintain the army for one year. These facts may interest France and England.

The Supreme Court of the United States has, for the last five years, refused to call the suits brought before it on appeal from the Circuit Courts in the second States. The parties could not well be present, and this was sufficient cause, but the mandates of the Court, in case of a decision, could not be executed, owing to the existence of the war, and this was conclusive with the Court. Nor will it now hear these cases without providing that suitable notice shall be given to the hitigants. Such an order will probably be made at the approaching term of the Court in Washington.

A striking curio-ity has lately been discovered in the Nevada Territory. It is a mountain of rock salt, situated about twenty miles from Mcadow Valley, and only eighteen miles from the head of navigation of the Colorado River. It rises abruptly from the pisio, about four hundred feet in neight, a mountain of pure, sparkling, wystakued salt.

OUR READERS will be pleased to find, this morning, the Addresses of the two Governors of this State, upon the occasion of the installation of the Constitutional Governor. They will also be pleased to see the hopeful, manly spirit expressed by both. Whether the purpose of Provisional Governor Perry to withdraw and allow the track to Constitutional Governor ORR is to be realized or not, is, perhaps, yet questionable. The President of this Republic, though intent, beyond question, upon the restoration of the Union, has yet to act upon issues and exigencies that are not even yet apparent; and though it is to be presumed he would desire the course professed to be pursued by Governor PERRY, it is not altogether certain it will be in amordance with political conditions as they may occur; and it is possible, therefore, that the programme may not be carried out, and that the act, graceful and considerate as it unquestionably is, of retiring before his constitutional successor, may not be permitted, in consistence with the objects and occasion of the National Executive.

It is to be hoped, however, that the process of restoration will be as rapid as is suggested by Governor PERRY. That this would be to the interests of our people, there can be no question-to the interest of ourselves, for much of our prosperity depends upon an early adjustment of difficulties, and that restoration of confidence in stability and order indispenof the Union—for much of the prosperity of agend. H. E. LORD the whole country must depend upon the suc- November 24 cessful cultivation of the South.

The South, in its aspirations to progress and improvement, is animated by no selfish or-unworthy purpose. It presents a plan, in accordance with which, if the labor shall be performed, the business of planting will be more pleasant and profitable to the proprietor than it has ever been, while it will be entirely in accordance with the interest and well-being of the laborers. That the labor will be performed efficiently, under the mere provisions of this contract, it were, perhaps, too much to assume. There are apt to bo, in all schemes of progress upon unexplored territory, something to perplex the programme; but it is reasonable to suppose that, under this contract, labor will be performed; that, if the consideration of ultimate consequences are not sufficient to induce the utmost capacity of the negro, they are presented here in such form of immediate pecuniary penalty, as will be most likely to effect him; that, if the scheme be not perfect, it may be the best possible under the circumstances; and, if it will not colonize Eutopia, enterprise may, at least, perform the equally profitable purpose of brightening and bettering the fortunes and condition of the spots upon this State to which they may be applied.

INCREASE OF THE STANDING ARMY .- Old regular officers and graduates of West Peint have been laying their heads together for some time past, and the result has been the framing of a bill which will undoubtedly be brought before the next Congress, and probably worked through, insamuch sa it is reasonable in every particular. It provides for a standing rrmy of seventy-five thousand men. which will require the addition of twenty-one regiments of infantry, three regiments of cavalry, and two of artillery Any increase in the staff departments is not favored. The pay of general officers to be reduced, and all officers to receive fixed salaries, as in the civil service. The scale of pay contemplated by the bill is, for lieutenant-general, five thousand dollars; major-general, four thousand; brigadier-general, three thousand; colonel, twenty-five hundred, down to second Heutenant, who will receive one thousand dollars. These salaries are looked upon as the fair thing by old officers, although considerably reduced from the old schedule. An effort will be made to create the grade of general, and have GRANT promoted to it; SHERMAN to be lieutenant-general, and giving THOMAS and SHEEIDAN brevets to that rank.
