

NAMELESS. A Novel. By Fanny Murdaugh Downing. Published by W. B. Smith & Co., Raleigh (N. C.)

This is a most remarkable book. Remarkable, inasmuch as though it is a palpable imitation of a portion of "Black House," it cannot, with justice, be set down as a plagiarism...

The heroine, Lady Haughton, is a copy of Lady Dedlock, as positively as any one thing can be the copy of another. Lady Dedlock is magnificently beautiful, cold and haughty—so is Lady Haughton.

All this has the appearance of a plagiarism, but it is not, and for these reasons; in the first place, the imitation is too palpable to be a plagiarism. No one in their sane senses would select the greatest of authors, and one whose works are universally read, to plagiarize from.

TO AVOID UNNECESSARY TROUBLE AND PRESERVE good order on this Island, it is hereby ordered: I. All parties claiming as original owners, plantations held by freedmen, and desirous of conferring with them, will report at these Headquarters previous to assuming personal charge of the same.

Attention is invited to Paragraph VIII, Circular No. 15, War Department, the provisions of which, together with other orders, subsequently issued, will be enforced.

Until further orders, civilians, white or colored, will be required to exhibit a pass from competent military authority or Assistant Bureau R. F. and A. L.

Such passes will be given for a limited time, and for the purpose of conferring with the freedmen only, or other specified reasons, and will not entitle the parties receiving them to establish any residence on the Island.

The foregoing regulations being complied with, all parties having business to transact on the Island are guaranteed entire security, and such assistance as may be properly rendered by the United States authority.
