THE CHARLESTON MARKET.

Thursday being a holiday, business was suspended, and yesterday, while there was much inquiry, holders appeared to be unwilling to meet buyers, and the transac-tions were very limited, sellers in most cases having withdrawn their stocks from the market. Although our receipts for the past week show an increase over any previous one this season, there is but a limited quantity placed on the market here, most of it being shipped or put into warehouse to await higher prices. 
