DEATH OF Mr. H. A. DeSAUSSURE.—On Sunday afternoon last the rites of sepulture were performed over the remains of one of our oldest and most esteemed fellow-citizens, HENRY A. DeSAUSSURE, Esq., who, at the age of seventy-six years, meekly closed his eyes in that sleep that knows no awakening, and the kind and pleasant face that we have almost daily met for years, has passed from our sight forever. For a long period of time he held the responsible office of Chairman of the Commissioners of the Orphan House of this city, and in that position had many opportunities of exhibiting that goodness of heart and benevolence of feeling which hundreds of those who were brought up in the institution, but are now occupied in the different pursuits of life, will remember with feelings of gratitude and affection; and it was this situation, perhaps, that threw him so often into communication with the poor, to whom he was always courteous and kind, giving them, at any time, the benefit of his fatherly advice and protection. As a member of the bar, his standing was eminent, and he was regarded by his brother members with a high degree of veneration, which was elicited by his talent as a counsellor and his pleasantness as a citizen. Born among us, he has passed a long life untouched by animosities that few escape from; and although in his day political enmities have existed very strongly, and party feeling has raged over every part of our State, still he was regarded by all with so much respect that no word was ever breathed against him. He has gone to the grave full of years, bearing the affection of a large family and numerous friends, who, with the many orphans whom he guided with fostering care, trust that he will receive the full reward of his many kind acts in this unfeeling world.
