'Let our just censure, attend the true event.' Obey this direction, and you have, perhaps, the very best principles upon which a good model newspaper should be conducted. It is to embody the true event. It is not to indulge in picking up random reports, for which there is no good authority, or if so, it is to warn readers against a too ready credence given to rumor; and it is to weigh the rumor according to a just judgment upon its inherent probabilities. It is to sift events, so as to settle certainly what is true and proper in them, and upon these it is to deliver a just judgment. Consure, by the way, in the old English, is only another word for judgment. Then, sgain, Shakspeare, in another place, speaking of a man of highest reputation, describes him as Great in mouths of wisest censure.

IX. WHERE OUR WEALTH!
