Old Bunyan's "Pilgrim's Progress" is a won. der of a book for the troubled mind, and Butler's "Anatomy of Melancholy" affords rare feeding for faucy as well as thought But we never once thought of looking to Robinson Crusoe for more than the gratification of curiosity and a passsing pleasure. until happening upon an advertisement of the book, in a Spanish translation, by a bookseller of Madrid. He announces the volume with such a pious flourish as might provide a model for the ambitious bookseller of any country. "Robinson Crusoe," quoth he, "is a most precious book among hooks; a book of such extraordinary events that they are utterly unequalled; and the reading of it will be found the most diverting and instructive that can be had. And not only does it serve for the instruction and recreation of all classes of society, but its morality is such that the most timid person may read it without fear that its maxims will cause any prejudice; and, indeed, with the full assurance that he will find in it . calming power which will give him strength to support with resignation the misfortunes connected with our miserable existence."

THE TRIAL.—The only development of importance in the assassination conspiracy trial yesterday was in relation to a draft for twenty five thousand dollars, purport-ing to have been drawn on the Montrea, branch of the Ontario Bank, in August. 1864, in favor of Mr. Benjamin Wood, proprietor of the Daily News, of this city. Mr. D. L. Eastwood, assistant manager of said bank, testified that Jacob Thompson, the rebel agent, kept his deposits in that institution; that these moneys accrued from the negotiation of bills of exchange drawn by the rebel Secretary of the Treasury on the rebel agents in Liverpool; that Thompson gave an order for twenty-five thousand dollars of these deposits to be paid to Wood; that a requisition to this amount was forwarded by the Ontario Bank to the cashier of the City Bank, New York, and that the witness understood that the money was pai? in this city on Mr. Wood's order. Mr. Listwood also testified that the assessin Pootle had dealt with the Ontario Bank.

Judge Abraham D. Russell and Mr. George Wilkes, of this city, were both examined by the court in regard to Mr. Benjamin Wood's endorsement on the twenty-five thousand dollars draft referred to. They testified that they were well acquainted with Mr. Wood's hand writing, and that they identified the signature as

Owing to the illness of one of the mem-bers of the court, the opening of the ar-gument by counsel for the defence, which was to have commenced yesterday, was postponed, and an adjournment till next Monday took place.

THE FENIAN FRIGHT IN ENGLAND -Notwithstanding the jolly air with which the London Times and other English journals treated our statement about the Fenians. they have taken the alarm and are evidently a good deal frightened. We perceive that a bill has been introduced in Parliament to increase the efficiency of the Irish constabulary. Any one who knows anything about that organization knows that it is about the most efficient police force in the world for purposes of coercion, as well as a detective body. It is composed of a regularly drilled army of about twelve thousand men, armed with carbines and in every way equipped like soldiers. These are not alone massed in the large cities, but are scattered in small parties as well, in barracks at distances of a few miles throughout the entire country. The "efficiency" of such a force in a small island can be easily understood. That farther "efficiency" is about to be provided by Act of Parliament, therefore, is evidently the result of a Fenian fright.

Unless Napoleon will give the strongest assurances of aid in men and money to the extent required by Maximilian, he threatens to leave the country and return

New Orleans, June 10.—A fight took place on the 2d inst. near Matamoras, between Gens. Cortina and Mejia. Cortina was about twenty five miles from the city, when Meja sent Lopez to repulse him with 2,000 men, but he was driven back by Cortina and forced to make for the American side of the Rio Grande. The latter expected reinforcements, but did not receive them.

NEWBERN, N. C., June 12 .- Gov. Holden has invited the leading Union men of the State to meet him in council at Raleigh prior to the appearance of his proclama-tion, which is daily expected.
